Village By Initiative To Win Contest No Longer Needs Wolfe For Fame

Prince Edward Island's Centennial Community of 1964, Cape Wolfe, is a shining example of what can be done when people co-operate wholeheartedly in a major undertaking, and have inspired leadership within a community.

Cape Wolfe, located 12 miles west of O'Leary, winner of the 1964 Rural Beautification Centennial Competition, out of 39 competitors, represented a transformation described by the judges as "nothing short of sensational."

The decision to enter the 1964 Rural Beautification Competition was made last fall at a meeting of the Cape Wolfe Women's Institute, made up of 11 active members, with Mrs. Reginald Currie as president and Mrs. Edmund Colliart as secretary.

The interest, enthusiasm and hard work of the WI members spread throughout the entire community of 54 households.

PLAYED MAJOR PART
"Beautification of Cape Wolfe has been a dream of mine for many years," said Mrs. Alvin Costain, one of the WI members who played a leading part in the beautification project.

"And we hope our success will encourage other communities to go ahead with similar or large improvement plans," added Mrs. Costain.

North of Cape Wolfe are the communities of Burton, Campbello and Morningside. In qualifying as the Centennial Community of 1964, all of Cape Wolfe's public buildings and properties — the church, school, community hall and two cemeteries — were repaired and redecorated, the grounds landscaped with concrete walks, flowers and attractive fences. Every public building was identified by a sign.

IMPROVE HOMES
Also a large number of homeowners improved their homes, by painting, whitewashing, removing unsightly buildings, planting flowers and making other general improvements.

By occupation most of the residents are farmers, fishermen or both. Fish are landed at Howard's Cove artificial harbor, where the "Giant's Chair" is situated. The chair is a large rock shaped like a seat, set aside by workmen when the harbor was under construction several years ago.

By virtue of being named the Centennial Community of 1964, Cape Wolfe will be the subject of an aerial photograph in natural color, which will be featured in the Island's tourist literature next year, it was announced.
