Did you know that most provinces in Canada have no over-all laws covering either milk pasteurization or meat inspection? Our protection depends on scattered municipal regulations. There are federal regulations for meat which can only be enforced when it is sold across provincial borders, but even this kind of rule does not exist for milk. The Canadian Association of Consumers is working for protection of these foods through province-wide regulations.
