Canadian Medical Ass'n Pressing For Legislation

EDMONTON (CP) — The Canadian Medical Association is pressing for legislation that would ensure that therapeutic abortions and sterilizations are legal in certain circumstances. The CMA approved suggested legislation in this field to be submitted to the Federal Justice Department. The act of legislation along the lines proposed by the CMA would require amendments to the Criminal Code.

The CMA proposes that a therapeutic abortion to end a pregnancy be lawful in the following circumstances: When it is performed by a qualified doctor with the approval of a therapeutic abortion committee which would be set up in most hospitals. When it is performed in an approved hospital — the CMA is to give further consideration to the question of what will constitute an approved hospital in such cases. When the patient and, when the hospital abortion committee deems necessary, the spouse or guardian have given consent. When the continuance of the pregnancy may endanger the life or the physical or mental health of the patient.

Under these conditions, a therapeutic abortion might be performed for a woman who has become pregnant as a result of rape, incest or seduction, or where there is a substantial risk of the child being born with a severe mental or physical disability.

COORDINATING EFFORTS
Dr. M.G. Tompkins of Halifax, chairman of a CMA committee on maternal welfare, said his committee is co-ordinating its effort to obtain legislation in the area of abortion with the Canadian Bar Association.

Island Horseman Back In The Game

There is probably no horseman more calculating and cautious about his everyday work and routine than Murdock Nicholson who by his own admission has been around longer than "you are first likely to think."

Born September 25, 1912 at Springton, Prince Edward Island, Nicholson is by no means a newcomer to harness racing, although in fact this is his first season of active competition at Rideau Carleton.

"After a stretch of farming," he tells, "I tried my hand at racing. It was more for the fun of it than anything else. I picked up a slow class filly by Calumet Budlong, Dot Budlong, I got deeply involved and have been at it ever since. That was back in 1947."

He went about driving right up until the fall of 1960 when for no apparent reason he got off the sulky after a race not to drive again for almost six years. Why the self imposed retirement? "I don't really know. At the time I was driving for Stanley Mayhew of Kinkora, P.E.I. who had one of the largest stables, number wise in Canada. I guess I wanted to see the big time, which I did. After visiting and working at almost every major track in Canada and the northern United States, I went to work for such master horsemen as Del MacTavish and Russ Caldwell."

MAY HAVE SET RECORD
LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Veteran flyer Fran Bera may have set a world altitude record Monday. Flight instruments indicate he may have climbed above the 40,000-foot mark in a specially equipped twin-engine Piper Aztec. However, official results of the flight will not be known until the aircraft's recording devices have been examined by the Federation Aeronautique Internationale in Paris. The record now is 39,334 feet.

Fish Markets Down Under Available

OTTAWA (CP) — Australia and New Zealand both have markets for fish that can be exploited by Canadian producers, a reconnaissance mission to the two countries reported Wednesday.

The mission, with representatives from government and industry, visited the countries in February. It found there is a growing

fish industry in both, but there were openings for Canadian products. The demand for canned salmon and sardines remains strong in New Zealand, with a preference for Canadian products. However, the report said an unfavorable balance of payments between New Zealand and Canada might bring a reduction in import quotas for canned fish in 1966-67. In Australia, the mission found fish production falls far short of demand. There was expansion largely in the production of tuna, scallops and
