LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

TORONTO, Oct. 1.—A firm in this city is arranging a monster deal by which the Rothschild firm of London, England, will acquire the complete control of the valuable petroleum wells in the vicinity of Petrolia, Ontario. Five million dollars is the amount which the firm is prepared to advance to secure the control of the oil properties. It is ascertained that the Standard Oil Company have been negotiating to get the properties with the view of cornering all the oil in America. If the Rothschild deal is consummated a material reduction in the price of oils will be the result.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 30.—Mrs. Mary Cass who died on Saturday night and was buried yesterday, spent the last few moments of her life sitting before a mirror. When Mrs. Cass became ill three months ago with dropsy, and was informed she could not recover, she refused to believe it and ordered a full length mirror placed in her room. Before this she sat day after day, carefully noting the changes in her appearance wrought by the ravages of disease. On the morning of her death, when seated before her mirror, she viewed her reflection and then calmly announced that she was about to die. She died with her eyes fixed on the mirror, and just before her death she gave orders that she be buried under a widespreading tree, as she had never liked the sun. She was

PITTSBURG, Pa., Oct. 30.—The bodies of two victims of the wreck on the Colorado Midland, Denver and Rio Grande Railroad at Newcastle, Col. on Sept. 9, were to-day identified as those of Elmer E. Black, for many years an engineer on the Pennsylvania Railroad, and his wife formerly Miss Wilson, of Derry, Pa., to whom he was married on Aug. 25. The two were on their wedding tour. The identification was made by means of a charred fragment of a Pennsylvania annual pass found on Black's body.

SIMLA, Oct. 1.—The campaign against the Mohmands has been successfully concluded, and nothing now remains but to collect the fines. The upper Mohmands have been severely punished, and the lower Mohmands, cowed by the success of the British troops, are accepting the terms of the British commanders. Raiders are looting in the vicinity of Mangusa. A force of insurgent tribesmen attacked Sudda yesterday, but were easily repulsed. All the English women have been removed to places of safety in the Kurrum valley.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 1.—Arthur Drapeau, who worked in this city twenty years ago for a dollar a day, reached here today on his way east. He has been in the Klondike, and is now on his way home to Quebec with a quarter of a million.

FLYMOUTH, Oct. 1.—The torpedo boat destroyers Lynx and Thrasher grounded yesterday during a fog on Dodman's Point. The Thrasher broke in two and it is expected the Lynx will do the same. The crews of both boats were taken off. Three stokers were killed and two were injured by the bursting of a steam pipe on board the Thrasher shortly after she grounded.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1.—The Call says the appraisers of the late J. G. Fair's estate have completed their task and will present their report to the probate court in a few days. The report will show that the value of the Fair estate has been very much over-rated instead of being valued at from thirty to sixty million, the appraisers say the official figures will be about \$12,000,000 and certainly not more than \$15,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—The Power Station of the Capitol Traction Company, a six-story building, occupying the entire square on Pennsylvania avenue, 13th and D streets was destroyed. The flames spread east, and several buildings on the south side of Pennsylvania avenue were burned. The street car lines were tied up, and the electric lights of the city went out. The loss is a million dollars.

MONTREAL, Oct. 1.—An important conference took place yesterday between Mr. T. G. Shaughnessy, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and Mr. J. B. McArthur, president of Rossland, (B. C.) Board of Trade, as a result of which Mr. Shaughnessy promised that the Canadian Pacific would build into Rossland at once, and that individuals connected with the railway would furnish the necessary capital to erect a smelter in the vicinity of Rossland, so that ores from the company be treated cheaper than they are across the border. In fact, it is proposed that the charge for smelting will be as near cost as possible. The C. P. R. will also connect the smelter with an aerial railway system, so that there will be easy access from all the mines.

NEWS NOTES.

The Clyde shipbuilding returns for August show a great falling off, owing to the strike of the engineers.

A man named Keltie, while jumping from the Sussex express at Hampton last Thursday, fell, breaking his nose and sustaining severe injuries.

Earthquakes are reported to have shaken many places on the northeast coast of Borneo and a new island has been thrown up near Mempakul.

Horatio David Davies, 63rd Conservative member of parliament for Othatham, has been chosen lord mayor of London, succeeding Sir George Faddel Phillips.

Captain McRae, formerly of Winnipeg, and who commanded a detachment of Canadian Voyageurs on the Nile Expedition in 1884, is in Montreal organizing a expedition to the Klondyke.

The anti-cigarette law enacted by the General Assembly of Tennessee, at its last session, has been declared unconstitutional by United States Circuit Judge Lorton.

The Spanish gunboat Neuva Espana captured a filibustering expedition at Bay Corrientes, Cuba. It is feared all were massacred. Among the party were twenty-eight Americans.

France has bought the late M. Waddington's collection of Greek coins for 421,000fr. It contains 73 gold, 1,360 silver and 5,635 bronze pieces. Among them are coins of 393 towns of Asia Minor.

Advices from Winnipeg state that this year has witnessed a remarkable increase in the volume of traffic on the Canadian Pacific railway, and also in the total sales of the land department.

A new Anglo-Russian newspaper, printed in the Russian language, it is about to be published at Moscow, as a part of the scheme of promotion of commercial relations between England and Russia.

Count Okuma, the Japanese Foreign Minister, is likely to represent Japan in the Behring Sea conference at Washington, not on account of the importance of the Behring Sea controversy but because of other important matters between Japan and the United States in the settlement of which he is desirous of assisting.

It is asserted in English naval circles that the torpedo boat commanded by Prince Carl, the son-in-law of the Prince of Wales nearly foundered in a storm while returning from the Jubilee festivities of the King of Sweden. The boat was damaged, and her crew, who had all but abandoned hope of reaching land, finally saved the Island of Bornholm, in the Baltic.

ENGINEERS INSPECTION.

The Charlottetown Engineer Company under command of Major Weeks was inspected on Saturday by Capt. Twining, R. E. The infantry inspection took place at Victoria Park in the morning. The turnout was large; the men looked smart, and the uniforms and accoutrements were clean and in good order.

After having received the inspector, who was accompanied by Lieut. Col. Moore and Sergt. Major Warburton, with a general salute, the company marched past and was then put through several battalion and company movements by the commanding officer and the other officers of the company.

After the infantry inspection the Company marched to Belvedere. Having taken a lunch provided on the grounds, the men were told off to their several tasks. A signal squad under Sergeant J. Field and Sapper W. P. Doull transmitted messages by flags and by electricity in a manner which surprised and delighted the inspecting officer. A field kitchen was constructed by a squad under Sergeant Gates, which was exceedingly well done. The bridging party were unable to complete the work intended owing to an accident whereby one of the large frames of the lock bridge was broken.

Capt. Twining expressed himself as well pleased with the work done, and with the capabilities of the officers and men of the corps.
