

Supply Ship Contract Let

VICTORIA (CP)—A \$1,300,000 contract for an Arctic supply ship has been awarded to Yarrows Limited shipyard by Northern Transportation Limited of Ottawa.

W. M. Gilchrist, president of the Crown company, signed the contract here.

Yarrows' general manager John Wallace said construction of the 225-foot ship will begin at once and will employ 150 men until May 8, date of delivery.

To be named the Frank Broderick, after a former president of Northern Transportation, the ship will replace the Harnes, built three years ago when it hit submerged ice.

The vessel will provide summertime service to the Canadian Arctic coast from Spence Bay on the west coast of the Boothia Peninsula to the Alaska Yukon border. It will be based at Tuktoyaktuk.

Quads' Mother Has Been Given Fertility Drug

NEW YORK (AP)—The mother of quadruplets born here last year had been treated with the experimental fertility drug after six childless years of marriage, it was disclosed here.

A spokesman for the Columbia-Presbyterian medical centre said Mrs. Martin Brecker of New York City was among 21 women to whom the drug, Pergonal, was administered at the centre's fertility clinic.

Of the 21 patients, 15 became pregnant and of the seven who have given birth so far, three had single babies, three had twins and one, Mrs. Brecker, had quadruplets, the hospital said.

The spokesman said that other medical researchers in the United States using the drug which contains human hormones, also report a high incidence of twins and Swedish scientists using it report many multiple births, including one set of stillborn septuplets. The drug was discovered in Italy.

An application is pending before the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for permission to market it. Up to now, the drug has been administered only at hospitals under strict supervision.

Steel Suggested For U.S. Coins

NEW YORK (AP)—Use of stainless steel in United States coinage as a substitute for silver was suggested here.

The idea was advanced by Swebways, an industry magazine that called attention to rising industrial consumption of silver, dwindling supplies and high prices.

The publication said stainless steel has been used in coins of other governments since 1939. An official of a leading precious metals refining firm recently called for minting of U.S. coins without silver, holding fast to the present rate of use U.S. treasury stocks were dropping uncomfortably fast.

Volvo Ponders Toronto Depot

TORONTO (CP)—A Volvo official said here the firm is planning to build a \$1,200,000 office and parts depot in Toronto next year.

Gunnar Engellau, managing director of the Swedish car company, said the decision to acquire land and build a 20,000-square-foot centre in Toronto was part of a three-year program mapped for Canadian operations at a meeting of company executives Monday.

The company's subsidiary firm, Volvo (Canada) Ltd., makes Volvo cars and marine engines in Dartmouth, N.S., and maintains distributing facilities in Toronto and Vancouver.

Mr. Engellau said the break-even point for the Dartmouth plant is 3,000 cars annually and there is a chance the Canadian subsidiary will turn a profit this year. He said 2,040 cars were sold in Canada last year and the company expects to double this during the three-year program.

He said no decision has been reached yet as to whether the Maritime plant will be expanded.

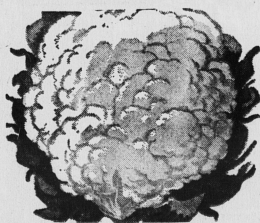
