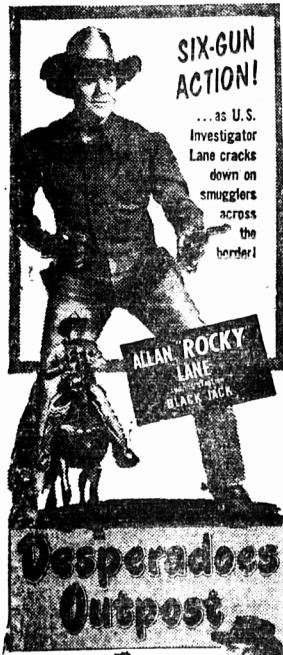
Miss Ruby Murphy returned to resume her training at the Falconwood Hospital, Charlottetown, after spending a week at her home at St. Mary's Road.
