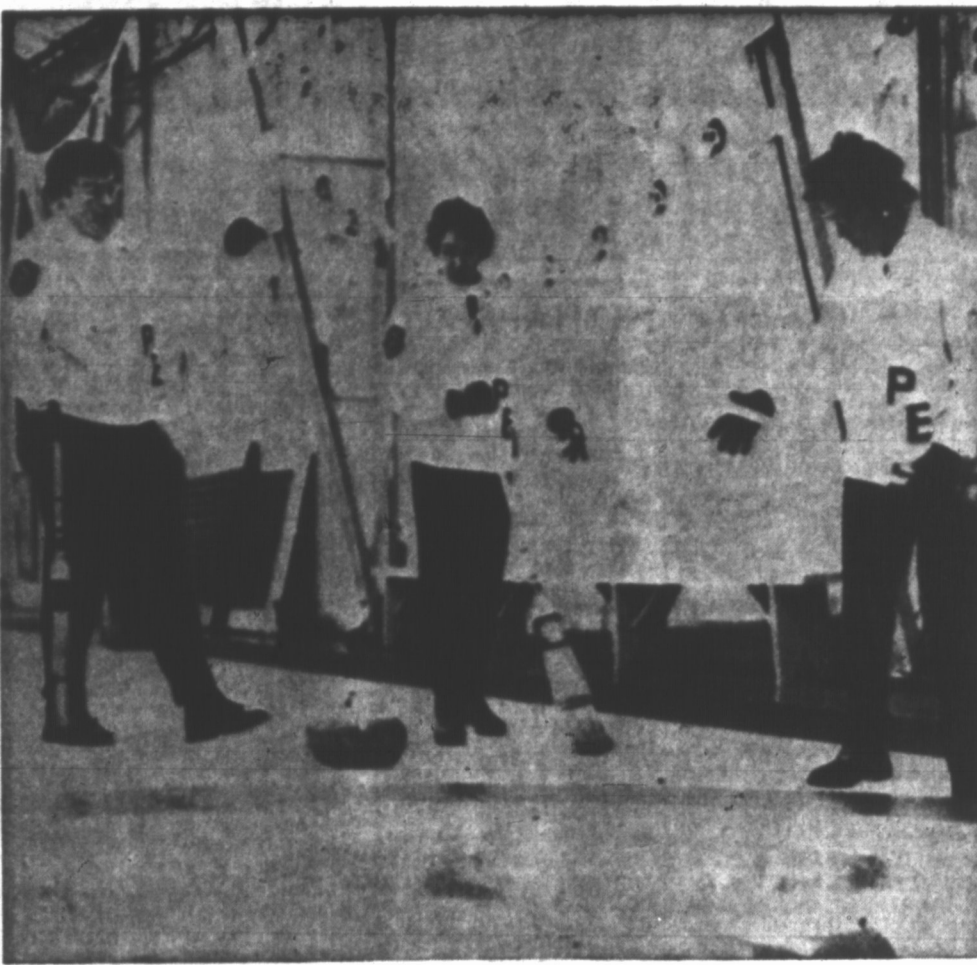

He favors Los Angeles and San Francisco, the current favorites in the NHL expansion derby, as the new U.S. entries. They would join Boston, New York, Detroit and Chicago in a six-team section.

Revelin says Canadian teams could be placed in Quebec City, Winnipeg, Vancouver and one other centre, joining Montreal and Toronto in the Canadian division.

MacMillan Wins 2 Games; Ties Quebec, Ont. For 1st

HALIFAX (CP)—Maybe Quebec's first French-speaking entry in the Canadian women's curling championship had never heard of Barbara MacNevin, but it was obvious Solange Larouche's foursome from Dolbeau had little respect for the former member of Saskatchewan's 1961 national champions.

Quebec wasted no time in jumping into a decisive lead over Mrs. MacNevin's rink from Delisle, Sask., as it picked up three points in the first end of its opening round match here and added five more in the third to coast to a 15-6 victory.

Fern Irwin's Ontario quartet from Toronto had to overcome a single-point deficit after nine ends to defeat a Manitoba rink from Winnipeg under skip Peggy Casselman by an 8-7 score.

P.E.I. WINS EASILY — Alberta, skipped by Dorothy Thompson of Edmonton, successfully fended off a late rally by Joan Callaghan of Bathurst, N.B., to record a 10-7 triumph, while Nova Scotia's Audrey Thorbourne of Liverpool disposed of British Columbia, skipped by Lesley Cmolik of Kelowna, 12-7.

Princess Edward Island, with skip Sybil MacMillan of Charlottetown, easily trounced Newfoundland, represented by Bobbie Fortune's Goose Bay, Labrador team, by a 14-5 count.
