

These Prince Edward Island Pharmacists ask you to Consider the EDUCATION & QUALIFICATIONS of a PHARMACIST



Before a person can become a Pharmacist in Prince Edward Island he or she must first complete Grade Eleven, Maritime Examining Board or Equivalent, attend and successfully pass an elementary course at The Maritime College of Pharmacy. On completion of this course and after having served twenty three months in a Pharmacy under the supervision of a Pharmaceutical Chemist, he or she may be duly registered a Certified Clerk.

He or she must then attend the Maritime College of Pharmacy at Halifax, N. S. (or other university of pharmacy recognized by the P. E. I. Pharmaceutical Association) for a three year university course which when successfully completed will qualify him or her for a Pharmacist's Certificate from the University.

Application may then be made to the P.E.I. Pharmaceutical Association for registration within the Association and if accepted, and after having completed three years apprenticeship—inclusive of apprenticeship served as a certified clerk, may write the P. E. I. Pharmaceutical Association exam.

The practical work, prior to the exam, must be under the supervision of a Registered Pharmacist who swears to the amount of time the apprentice puts in, and also swears to the apprentice's conduct, attitude toward pharmacy work, his character etc.

After successful completion of the examination, the apprentice is then given a certificate from the P. E. I. Pharmaceutical Association to show that he is a Registered Pharmacist. He must then purchase a license to practice Pharmacy in P. E. I. This license is renewed each year, and can be revoked for various reasons including drunkenness, dope addiction, carelessness, etc.

The P. E. I. Pharmaceutical Board is composed of three members one appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor-In-Council and two by the P. E. I. Pharmaceutical Association. Board examinations are held at least once in every year, and exams written by the prospective pharmacist consist of Pharmacology, Materia Medica, Chemistry, Botany, etc.



PROGRESS IN PHARMACY

From earliest days on . . . medicine and pharmacy have worked hand in hand to serve the people's health.

THE PHARMACIST IS RESPONSIBLE

The Pharmacist is responsible along with the doctor for the dosage of the medicine prescribed. Thus if a doctor writes a prescription incorrectly, it is the pharmacist's duty to check with the doctor, to correct him. If he doubts the authenticity of a prescription the Pharmacist may refuse to fill it.

CONCLUSION

The profession of pharmacy is serious business. It takes a good and thorough education and passage of an exacting examination for a person to qualify to handle the filling of doctor's prescriptions. P. E. I. is blessed with a good quota of pharmacists, for this we should be thankful. The responsibility of filling prescriptions in any community is one of the most important for the continued good health of its citizens.

THE OPIUM AND NARCOTIC DRUG ACT OF CANADA

The Act provides that the Pharmacist . . .

1. Must identify the patient in the filling of a prescription which uses narcotics. He must be sure the prescription is filled for the correct person.
2. Must know that the doctor's signature on such a prescription is authentic.
3. Must know that the Doctor is registered within the Province.
4. Must know that the narcotic will be used for legal purpose.

FOOD AND DRUG ACT OF CANADA

This Act provides for rigid control in the dispensing of barbiturates, antibiotics etc., and only registered Pharmacists and Doctors are authorized by the Act to dispense these drugs.

DRUG STORES ARE REQUIRED . . .

Drug stores are required to have these books available for the use of their Pharmacist:

- (a) The British Pharmacopoeia
- (b) The Canadian Formulary
- (c) New Products Index, etc.
















A PHARMACIST MUST . . .
