The Russian steamer "Mostaway," with 200 men on board, is supposed to have foundered with all hands in the Indian Ocean.

WM. ATKINSON, a Halifax fruit-dealer, receives daily from Chas. Hazen, of Sussex, N. B., 500 to 600 boxes of cultivated berries.

IRON ore shipments are arriving so rapidly and in such quantities at Kingston, Ont., that the full capacity of outgoing vessels is required to keep it from accumulating.

A MEETING of the Dominion Alliance will be held in the committee rooms, over Kenney's Confectionery, on Monday evening, at 8, sharp.

The steamer Mironichki arrived from Montreal this forenoon with a cargo of merchandise. She also brought a large number of excursionists, who spent the afternoon promenading in the city.

A HEAVY thunderstorm passed over Albert Co., N. B., on Monday last. A great deal of property was injured, and a valuable blood mare, bought on P. E. Island by Mr. Mitton, of Prosser Brook, was killed by lightning.

FOR WINNIPEG.—A lad named John Hughes was at the Moncton depot on Monday night, having come from County Line, P. E. Island, where his parents formerly lived. Nine years ago, he said his father went to Winnipeg, and he was now going there to seek him. He was not sure that he could identify him, but he felt sure he could find him out by inquiry. About nine months ago his mother went to the United States, since which time he has not heard from her, and has lived on the generosity of the people. He expects to reach Winnipeg on the dead-head principle.—Moncton Transcript.

CONVERSATIONS.—It is proposed to hold a Conversations and Flower Festival, on Thursday, the 3rd of August, in the Drill Shed, to promote the establishing of a Reformatory and Industrial School. On that occasion it is intended to form a Committee of gentlemen to devise the best means for providing a suitable building for the institution; and who will at a later day wait upon the Government with a view to securing an annual grant for its maintenance. To better promote the formation of such a committee, Colonel Gray, as Chairman of the preliminary meeting, advised that the ladies of the committee should specially invite the Clergy, the members of the Bench and the Bar, and also His Worship the Mayor, to countenance, by their presence on that occasion, the work in hand.

Egyptian War Notes.

THE KHEDIVES PROCLAMATION.

The following is the text of the Khedive's proclamation:—"ARABI PASHA.—In consequence of your departure to Kafr-el-Dewar, accompanied by the army, thus abandoning Alexandria without orders, stopping railway traffic, preventing us from receiving telegrams and communications through the post, and impeding the return of refugees to their homes in Alexandria, and of your persistence in war preparations and your refusal to come to us after receiving orders, I dismiss you from the office of Minister of War."

The Khedive issued the following circular to the army:—"In perusing the order for the dismissal of Arabi Pasha from the office of Minister of War you will know the great motives which necessitated his dismissal. Hence forward he will have no authority over you. Whosoever agrees with his designs and movements will have participated in his crimes. Whosoever shows obedience and conforms to our rule deserves honor, courtesy and good remuneration. You must be aware that the country is surrounded with dangers and perils, for the Powers have agreed on Turkish intervention for the reform of the country without damaging the privileges of the firmans granted to Egypt. I am convinced that you will conform yourselves to my orders, which cannot have any object other than the welfare of the country. He who obeys my orders will be rewarded; he who does not will have to blame himself on being punished."

"After the bombardment of Alexandria a council of war was held under our presidency. Dervish Pasha assisted and Arabi Pasha was present. It was decided not to surrender the ports until ordered by the Sultan. A telegram was sent to Constantinople to this effect. Arabi Pasha then returned to Alexandria. I ordered him to reinforce the forts. He replied that he would never do so, and then started for Kafr-el-Dewar. Unless I was certain that the object of France and England was not to take possession of Egypt, but merely to restore order, I should have been the first to give my life in defence of the country."

"THE KHEDIVÉ, "At the Palace." The British have appointed Achmet Rifaat, Governor of Alexandria. His duties will be mainly nominal, but his use as a figurehead will enable authority to be exercised without wounding the native susceptibilities. A mail steamer from Constantinople, just arrived, has been embargoed and the captain arrested on suspicion of treachery. She was conveying letters to Arabi Pasha. The steamer is guarded by four steam launches from the British fleet. The despatches were seized. Two of Arabi's colonels, disguised as dervishes, are said to be lurking in the city. It was stated at the Washington Navy Department on Friday that Rear Admiral Nicholson, commanding the American fleet at Alexandria, Egypt, was instructed to look after the protection of American interests there, and that if he mixed up in the war further than that, it was entirely upon his own responsibility. Nothing official has been received from him since the day the bombardment began, when he announced that fact, and also acknowledged the receipt of the departments instructions to look after American interests; nor has the department communicated with him since that time. Secretary Chandler is not prepared to say that Admiral Nicholson exceeded his authority in assisting the British in patrolling the streets of Alexandria and in certain other acts, until he has been officially advised of the attending circumstances.

The Khedive's wife, the Vice-Queen, as she is called, is a daughter of El Hamid Pasha, and granddaughter of the famous Abbas Pasha. She is a beautiful and cultivated woman, who tenderly loves her husband and her four children, and takes an active part in the education of the latter. The eldest boy, Abbas, and his brother are taught by a Swiss pedagogue, and the little girls are under the care of an English nurse.

The Khedive has signed the dismissal of Arabi Pasha, and declared him a rebel. He will issue a general order, forbidding the Egyptian army to obey Arabi's orders, and forbidding the people to pay him taxes. Cairo, from its almost impregnable citadel, could withstand a siege for several months. There were constantly kept stacked there 100,000 stand of Remington rifles prior to this crisis, besides heavy rifled ordnance. General Stone had repeatedly declared it impregnable. Siege guns could not reach the summit; mortars might.

Considering the configuration of the territory, the ready exit for men resolved on flight that Asia Minor or Arabia present, it is difficult to see how any European forces can be handled so as to prevent the escape of a body of men accustomed to desert travel. The Soudan (the vast hot desert to the south, and on the side of the Nile) affords an asylum to which no European force could expect to penetrate.
