Local and Other Items.

POTATOES FROZEN—It is said that two-
thirds of the potatoes in Michigan farmers'
hands were frozen during the late cold
snap.

FOR LIBRARY FUND—How McGee cap-
tured and held Montreal is one of the
episodes especially interesting to politi-
cians that will be told in Mr.
McCready's lecture in the Y. M. C.
A. Hall on Thursday evening. Proceeds
in aid of the Prince Street school library
fund. Admission 10 cents.

A GHASTLY FIND—A box, two feet long
and one foot wide, that has been nearly a
year unclaimed at the express office in
Baldwin, O., has been opened, and found
to contain a human body that was cut to
pieces to fit the box. The box was sent by
Adams' Express from Cincinnati, consigned
to Dr. Emerick, whose whereabouts are
unknown, and who has not been in Bald-
win for ten years. The name of the sender
is unknown.

CONCERNING THE BICYCLE—The bicycle
is getting there, so to speak. In twelve
States of the Union laws have been passed
to compel railroad companies to carry
bicycles as baggage. Massachusetts has
empowered cities and towns to lay out
bicycle paths, and in Ohio these paths are
paid for by a \$1 tax on each machine. More
than that—street sprinklers in Ohio cities
must leave a driveway a yard wide on
which the man on the iron steed has the
right of the way.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND APPLES—A
P. E. I. correspondent writes of a re-
cent visit to a farm of Mr. F. G. Boyver,
near Georgetown: "Before Iaving the
farm we looked into the orchard, where
we saw a vigorous plantation of apple
trees, largely Ben Davis, with one corner
devoted to Golden Russett, Wealthy,
Duchess, and Baldwin. This orchard
furnished the greater proportion of the
shipment of Ben Davis apples to
Great Britain, made by Hor S. S. Mac-
Ferguson, on the direct ocean steamer
Gaspesia, in December last. The cash
returns from that venture are so satis-
factory that it may be considered an-
established fact that P. E. Island can
produce apples good enough to please
British fruit consumers. The Golden
Russett grown in this orchard surpass any
we have ever seen. The introduction of
Island apples to the British market is
likely to mark a new era in orchard
management to as great an extent as the
cheese factories and creameries have put
life and hope into the dairy business."—
Farmers Advocate.

THE SUBMARINE TORPEDO BOAT.

Mr. T. A. Brassay, who, as editor of the
Naval Annual, speaks with authority, has
expressed a reassuring contempt of sub-
marine boats. The one thing fatal to their
extensive use, he observes, is that "it is
not possible to see under water." The
range of vision is at any rate insignificant.
But the inventors of these contrivances
claim to have met that difficulty by keep-
ing their small conning tower above water
until they near the mark. The tower it-
self is nearly invisible at any distance
worthy of the name, and it might possibly
escape attention altogether in the hurry
and excitement of an action. This would
seem to suggest that boats of this sort
are conceivably dangerous to other than
ships at anchor, though Mr. Brassay appears
to think otherwise. It is probable that they
will have their place as agents of destruc-
tion, but that their effect is hugely over-
rated in France just now. The torpedo,
which looked a far greater certainty, has
revolutionized naval warfare, though we
were told it was not going to do so. The
same thing may be said of the torpedo boat.
The main issues in the war between Spain
and the United States were all decided by
the gun. The other things, including
the submarine boat, will probably come
in somewhere, but their place as chief
factors has yet to be found.—London Daily
News.

—Mr. Fisher has told the Bedford
dairymen that the best cheese that goes
into the English market comes from Scot-
land. This, as the Gazette says, will come
as a surprise to some Canadians who
thought their product headed the list. It
should also come as an incentive. Other
peoples may make as good cheese as the
best Canadian, but none should be allow-
ed to make better.

A curious phenomenon was witnessed
recently at daybreak upon the opening of
one of the gates of Soochow, in China.
Some four thousand or more rats of all
sizes were seen to file out of the gates,
showing no fear of the country people
who were flocking into sell their market
produce in the city. The Chinese believe
this indicates some great disaster.
