

The news from Central America is unimportant. Another revolution in Colombia was talked of, but nothing serious had occurred. The British schooner "Utahe" had arrived at Panama with General Pezart on board, who sailed for France.

Advisers from Bogota state that the attempts to overthrow the Government of the interior States have been suppressed, or nearly so. The outward-bound passengers by the *Belle* left Panama for San Francisco, on board the *Sacramento*, on the 1st instant.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**  
New York, Dec. 19, p. m.—A San Francisco dispatch says that the latest report of the Columbia River gold fields represents them to be the richest in the world. Small-pox is raging among the freedmen in the vicinity of Selma, Alabama, to such an extent that they are not allowed to enter that city, except under the most pressing circumstances. A bill has passed Congress, which has been approved by the President, prohibiting the importation of cattle from foreign countries.

New York, Dec. 20.—A Washington dispatch says that while the President was preparing his message for Congress, the French Minister emphatically stated that the Emperor Napoleon would much regret that any expression in the message would make it impossible for him to recede from his Mexican scheme, without humiliating the Emperor. Mr. Seward said the French troops would be withdrawn from Mexico in a little while, and would be satisfied on the part of the United States Government. It is reported that General Logan is satisfied that there will be no difficulty, and that the Republic of Mexico will soon be peacefully reconstituted. Raphael J. Semmes, late of the *Alabama*, was arrested on the 14th inst. in Montgomery, Alabama, by orders from Washington, and is on his way North.

New York, Dec. 21.—Advices from Port Antonio state that Salnave, the Haytian rebel General, was at Monte Cristo endeavoring to recruit a force of 2000 men, and was offered a reward for his capture. At Cape Haytien the British were endeavoring to raise the vessels sunk during the bombardment. The vessel captured by the rebels, and which caused the interference of the British fleet, is now said to have been chartered by Gifford and to have had troops on board at the time of her capture. (Gold 14 1/2.)

**LATEST.**  
By Telegraph to A. McNeill, Superintendent Charlotte-Reading Room.  
Charlotte, 29th Dec.—Terrorful case of suffocation from gas, occurred in Bremen Hotel, Chicago, on Saturday night. Five men found dead; one was alive but insensible. The six slept in same room. The American Consul of the *Alabama*, for violating the laws of War, but more especially for hoisting the white flag on the *Alabama* and then refusing to surrender himself, and re-engaging in warfare with out being exchanged. The American Consul at Manchester, England, states that the Cattle Plague is still spreading. Fears of a negro insurrection prevail in different parts of Virginia. A negro who attacked a policeman in Norfolk was shot by the latter. A riot in Alexandria between the negroes and whites, in which six negroes were killed and many wounded. The Merchant's Exchange, a large five-story building in Montreal, was burned on Christmas eve. The Chief of the Fire Brigade and two firemen were injured by falling stoves. Schooner *Adonis*, from Halifax to P. E. Island, with general cargo, went ashore at Carriacou Island in Thursday forenoon. Cargo not ascertained, cargo being sunk with little damage.

**PLASTER COVE, Dec. 27th.**—The barque *Petrel* anchored off port Mulgrave on Sunday night, and Monday dragged out to North Entrance Straits, losing anchors and chains, got aground on Long Beach, off Mulgrave, and was brought into Plaster Cove. Election in Lunenburg County, N. S., on 27th, resulted in defeat of Opposition and anti-Candidate by 300 majority. Flour 5 to 10 cents higher. Wheat, quiet. Corn and provisions quiet but firm. Saturday, Dec. 30th, 1865.—Steamship City of Washington arrived with dates to the 14th. Governor Eyre, of Jamaica, has been suspended from his functions pending an official enquiry. Sir Henry Stokes appointed temporarily in his place. Stocks sailed for Jamaica on 15th December. The *Times* says Eyre's position will be that of Governor on leave of absence until the enquiry is over. The *Morning Post* thinks Eyre's suspension may have a bad effect on the negroes. At the Fenian trials on the 12th, O'Donovan occupied the whole day in his own defence—he was very insolent. He has been sentenced to penal servitude for life.
