Business Spotlight

(By Forbes Rhude) Canadian Press Business Editor For the first time in Canadian history, Canada now stands on the verge of a great age of iron production which will have a profound influence on the development of this country and, doubtless, on the North American continent. This statement is from editorial comment introducing a special primary steel and iron number of Industrial Canada, published by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

The lead article, by H. G. Hilton, president of the Steel Company of Canada, Ltd., is a review of the Canadian steel industry. It outlines its growth and also gives the industry's side of the case in the present shortage. Other articles deal with operations of the various steel companies and with Canada's ore deposits. In regard to the latter, W. M. Goodwin of the Federal Department of Mines, comments: "It is now, in fact, one of the most favored countries in the world (in iron ore). In balance, we shall soon have a great deal more than enough for our own needs, and can then ship the surplus to countries where there is a deficiency, notably Britain and the United States."

Details are given of the major known Canadian iron ore bodies: Algoma's Michipicoten properties in Ontario; Steep Rock, 140 miles west of Port Arthur; the Labrador Finds; Wabana on Newfoundland's Bell Island. Mr. Hilton notes that Canada's production has more than doubled since 1939, and concludes: "With the rapid increase in Canadian population and expansion of industry during the last decade, the outlook for the Canadian steel industry is much sounder and brighter than it has ever been."

Mr. Hilton also comments on the present situation: "There is not enough steel to go around, nor is there enough aluminum, nickel, zinc or copper; but while shortages of the latter are recognized for what they are, a natural consequence of abnormal demand, steel has become so necessary to all human activity that a lack of it is felt by everyone and invariably excites more than its share of attention. The fact is that since the rise of the industry the steel industry has had thrust upon it the role of whipping boy in every period of scarcity and, by the same token, has had to bear reproaches for over-capacity in times of depression."

"Expansion of steel capacity is seldom speculated and it may be for this reason that the remarkable progress made in Canada has not been generally recognized. Few people realize that the record of its growth over the last 10 years outstrips that of any other country."

GOVERNMENT DEPOSITS OTTAWA, Jan. 18 (OP) - Dominion Government deposits increased \$1,107,000 to \$89,083,000 during the week ended Jan. 17, the Bank of Canada reported today in its weekly financial statement. Chartered bank deposits decreased \$16,292,000 to \$357,450,000, while notes in circulation decreased \$19,615,000 to \$1,317,291,000.

May Boost Air Force Recruiting In Summerside

An expansion of the present recruiting facilities is probable at the Summerside R. C. A. F. Station, it was learned yesterday in a news release. This will be due to the lowering of the physical and educational requirements for ground crew enlistments which it is expected will result in possibly three to four times the number of enlistments from this province. The Air Force recently announced that men will now be permitted to enlist between the ages of 17 and 30 inclusive. Previously, to be eligible, a candidate must not have passed his thirtieth birthday. In addition to the broadening of the age category, persons with a grade eight education are now acceptable for all ground crew trades, and the aptitude and classification tests given at the recruiting centers will now be eased. The new requirements have been put into effect to increase the number of ground crew which will be available for the mounting operational activities being undertaken by the R. C. A. F.

Station court tonight when two teams from this City will meet with the Western Capital league representatives there in a double hoop bill. Georgetown, which will be a record for late shipment from Island ports. At the same time there is some considerable quantity of tablestock moving to the domestic market. The prices being paid are generally 50 cents a bag for No. 1 tablestock, while for seed prices are ranging from 40 cents to 45 cents per bushel. "It looks as though the present heavy movement will be sustained for at least another two weeks," Mr. Shaw states. "It is estimated that the seed potato quota to the United States of two and one-half million bushels will last until mid or late February. The market has held firm during the past week and should remain so for at least the next week."

Heavy January Movement

"The potatoes are being moved to the capacity of the railway cars available. It looks as though the total movement for the month of January will be almost a record. The railway reports that they have heavy orders for cars on hand but still expect to be able to maintain the movement at least at the present rate. "According to the recent report from Ottawa our stock holdings in Canada are considerably less than last year as of the present date. The figures are for this year 18,700,000 bushels of storage holdings as compared to 20,491,000 last year."

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Claims Agents In Conference

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 18 - A conference of claims agents on the Atlantic coast of the Canadian National Railways is being held here today at which matters dealing with the handling of general claims on the part of the public against the railway are being discussed. W. J. McRae, chief claims agent Moncton is presiding. Speaking of claim matters in general, Mr. McRae said that the nature of the claims handled by his department refer particularly to accident cases or damage to property. Workmen's compensation also comes under this category. Mr. McRae said that the conference is being held particularly with a view to improving methods of handling claims and to provide for prompt settlement. Every accident, he said is thoroughly investigated, which entails considerable detail. A great portion of these claims arise out of highway crossing accidents, he continued, and a campaign is now underway in endeavour to educate the public to the hazards and to exercise greater care. Workmen's compensation cases are another factor, Mr. McRae said, which are handled by his department, and constant attention is being given to the matter of prevention of accidents among the employees, not only for their own good but also to keep the accident costs to the lowest possible minimum.
