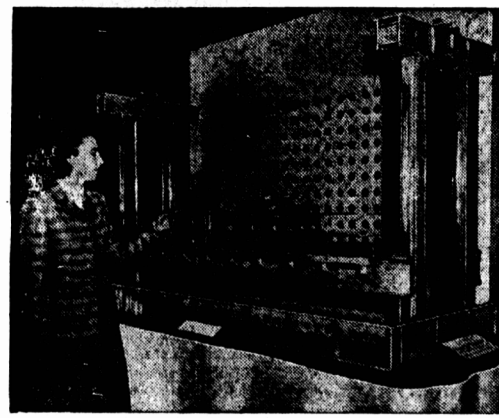

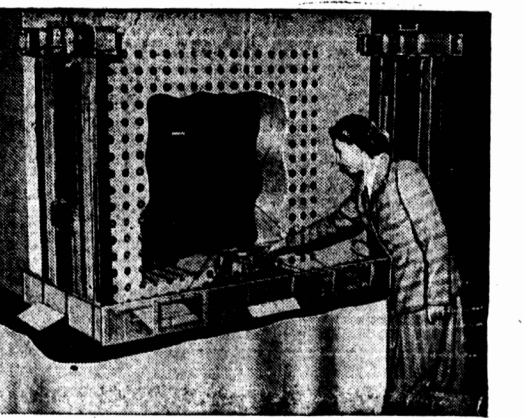

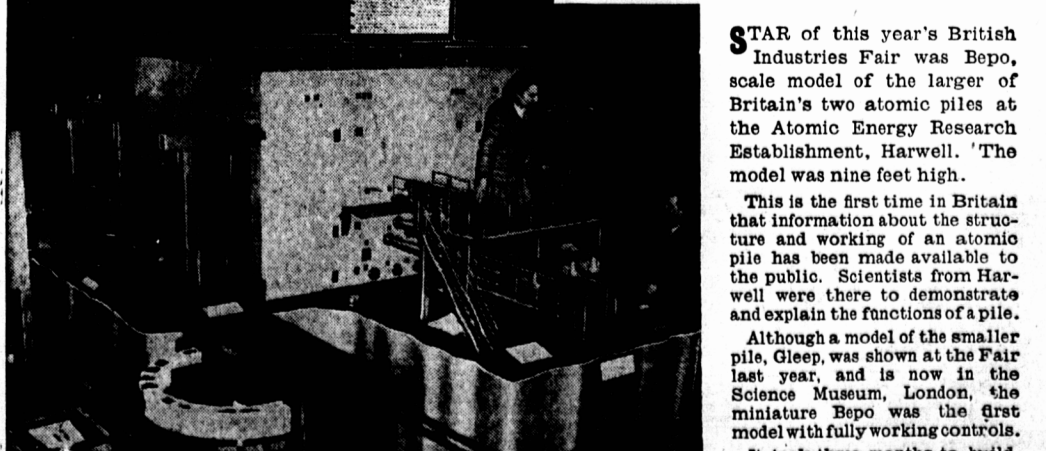


Miss A. M. Wildblood, Experimental Officer at Harwell, demonstrates working controls of Bepo.

MODEL ATOMIC PILE



Most of the visitors to the British Industries Fair spent to see the scale model of the Bepo pile. Experts were available on the stand to explain the functions of an atomic pile.

STAR of this year's British Industries Fair was Bepo, scale model of the larger of Britain's two atomic piles at the Atomic Energy Research Establishment, Harwell. The model was nine feet high. This is the first time in Britain that information about the structure and working of an atomic pile has been made available to the public. Scientists from Harwell were there to demonstrate and explain the functions of a pile. Although a model of the smaller pile, Gleep, was shown at the Fair last year, and is now in the Science Museum, London, the miniature Bepo was the first model with fully working controls. It took three months to build, and is the finest model of its type in the world.
