**P.E.I. Day Training Class For Retarded Children Now Open**

The Prince Edward Island Day Training Class for retarded children opened at West Kent School on Monday morning last, with five children attending. This number will eventually increase to ten, and the class will operate as a pilot project until the end of June. During the summer months arrangements will be made to give additional children the opportunity of enrolling in September. For those who are not quite ready for group experience are to receive individual assistance in the afternoons.

Those now attending were screened by the Mental Health Clinic and were prepared for their entry to school through home visits by the teacher, Miss Sue Hollett, this method will be conducted wherever possible.

During the instructional periods each child will receive attention according to his or her needs and through constructive play equipment the development of finger dexterity and muscular co-ordination will be aided. As the span of attention is increased the children will begin to experience joy in the achievement of being able to complete a task. Special attention will be given to speech training, and music is intended to play an important part of the program.

Miss Hollett said it takes time and patience to teach children who are retarded and progress may be very slow. It is necessary they be taught to function at their own mental level and with consistent training, they will in time they will be capable of looking after their own personal needs. By learning to get along with others they will find life in the community more pleasant and in time, some of the children will become independent citizens.

**Howe Will Act As Executor In Dunn Will**

OTTAWA (CP)—Trade Minister Howe said Friday he would act as an executor of the \$66,000,000 estate of the late Sir James Dunn but only in a limited capacity.

Mr. Howe, a close friend of Sir James, was one of five executors and trustees named in the will. The estate involves such strategic holdings as the huge steel industry at Sault Ste. Marie.

Asked Friday about rumors that he would withdraw, Mr. Howe said he had been asked by Sir James to serve as an executor in order that he might help ensure the holdings are disposed of in the public interest.

"That would be his only responsibility," Mr. Howe said. He would not play any part in handling tax payments or other financial arrangements apart from property disposal.

"I would not want to see it get into the wrong hands," he said.

Sir James, who died last January and chairman of Algoma Steel Corporation, centred at Sault Ste. Marie, Ont. He or his immediate group were generally believed to hold more than half the 1,650,000 shares issued by the big steel and iron ore industry.

Named as executors and trustees of the estate were: Mr. Howe; Lady Dunn; Sir James' son, Sir Philip; his sister-in-law, Olympia Kedros; and E. Gordon McMillan, Toronto lawyer.
