News from Quebec.

QUEBEC, Oct. 27.

A letter was read from Cardinal Taschereau in the churches of the diocese yesterday advising those who smuggle or sell whiskey without a license, that they cannot be absolved except by the Cardinal or by his grand vicars.

In court here the other day, Messrs Lacoste and Casgrain insisted that Judge Andrews should force Cardinal Taschereau to reply to a question that was put to His Eminence as a witness in a suit that had been brought against a religious order.

On Saturday L'Electeur said that the two lawyers wanted to send the Cardinal to jail. Messrs. Lacoste and Casgrain having sued that paper it comes out to-day with an ample apology and takes everything back.

Damage By the Tide.

BOSTON, Oct. 27.

The extremely high tide of the past two days has caused much damage along the line of the Boston, Revere Beach and Lynn Railroads. The East Boston Tunnel contains water a foot in depth, and beyond the tunnel nothing but water can be seen. The water is clean over the sea wall and at Winthrop Junction everything is completely surrounded with water. The residents are imprisoned in their houses until the tide subsides. No damage to the docks is reported.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.

The number three of George Johnson's commercial pamphlets is shortly to be issued. It will be devoted to Australian trade. Number two on South American trade is being asked for from all parts of the Dominion, and a second issue is probable.

The High Commissioner cabled to-day that he was forwarding a petition from England asking commutation of Birchall's sentence.

The Carleton Railway.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 27.

At a meeting of the Common Council this afternoon, a committee reported on the offer of the Dominion Government to sell the Carleton branch railway to the city for \$50,000. They recommended that the offer be accepted, and that they be authorized to negotiate for the transfer. The report was adopted. The city intend to hand the branch over to the Canadian Pacific, which will give the latter a clear right of way down to the western harbor front.

Another Strike.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 27.

37 operators on the Western Union Telegraph Company's office in this city, struck at 8 p. m., to-night. All the company's wires into this city are idle. The walk out is on account of the discharge by the company a few days ago, of six operators, supposed to belong to the brotherhood. The discharged men called on Supt. McMichael, of Minneapolis, this afternoon, to try to effect an agreement, but were not recognized, the strike is the result.

He Got Nine Years.

LAWRENCE, Mass., Oct. 27.

In the superior court to-day, William Murdock, of Lynn, pleaded guilty to placing a rail on the Boston and Maine railway tracks at Saugus. He did it in hope of obtaining a reward for notifying the railroad officers of the obstruction. He was sentenced to nine years in the state prison.
