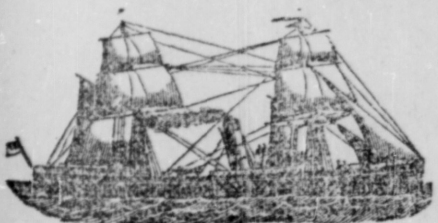

SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

MONCTON, July 22.—Tuesday was the last excursion of the present session. Rain prevented much natural science work being done.

On Wednesday, in response to an invitation from D. Pottinger, Esq., Manager of Government Railways, the School visited the work shops of the I. O. R., with the 800 employees and monthly payroll of \$41,000. Insects and some of their habits formed the subject of a Round Table Talk, conducted by F. A. Dixon, Esq., M. A., of Sackville, N. B. The last of the Talks given on Thursday evening was conducted by W. A. Hickman, Esq., of Pictou, N. S., the subject was Birds of North America. In a most interesting talk Mr. Hickman, who has studied the birds in their native haunts, treated of the various orders speaking of their habits, manner of procuring a livelihood etc. He gave special directions for distinguishing the different orders, drew diagrams of bill, claw, wing, etc. Mr. Hickman is probably the best informed amateur ornithologist in the Maritime Provinces. He has personally examined every bird known in the Maritime Provinces to accomplish which he has travelled upwards of 6000 miles in a year, 3000 of which he has been on foot.

Subjects that have received a great deal of attention this year at the school have been physiology and hygiene. The instructor in these subjects was S. A. Starratt, Esq., of Yarmouth, N. S. Mr. Starratt has the excellent quality in an instructor, of not telling much, but succeeds in getting his students to find out for themselves. He leads along the line of investigation they do the research.

A mere mention of the subjects considered in each lesson will give an idea of the scope and practicability of the work undertaken. They were as follows:

- I. Composition and growth of the body.
 - II. Water, uses and importance quantity required and sources of supply, impurities and purification.
 - III. Food, adulteration, diet, milk, diseases connected with food.
 - IV. Nutrition, digestion, absorption, excretion.
 - V. Teeth.
 - VI. The skin, structure and functions, care of the skin, bathing.
 - VII. The nervous system, the sympathetic system, development of our special senses, comparison with those of other animals.
 - VIII. The eye, defects, injuries caused by improper light.
 - IX. Taste and smell.
 - X. Poisons and antidotes.
 - XI. Narcotics.
 - XII. Physical exercise.
- This course is illustrative of the practical nature of the work followed in all the subjects.
- At the final meeting of the faculty the usual votes of thanks were passed, and with the examinations to-day the session of 1893 will close. J. D. S.
