Montreal Trust Reports Profit of \$17 Million

Montreal, Feb. 26 (CP)—Donald F. Kerlin, Montreal Trust president, strongly advocated the removal of legal cash from banks, trust companies and "near banks" at his company's annual meeting.
"It would make for a more competitive financial system," Kerlin said, "but neither Montreal Trust nor any other well-established institution has any reason to fear a strengthening of competitive forces in Canadian financial markets."
Mr. Kerlin expressed his confidence in the prospects for the steady growth of well-established financial institutions. Noting that several new companies, opening under provisions of the company charter, are actively searching for interest-bearing deposits to invest in mortgages and other types of fixed interest obligations, he cited the unique development of a recently established trust company, with associates making application to create a new chartered bank.
"There may be some concern that over-optimism will result in these new institutions finding themselves in difficulties. There is evidence that governments, both federal and provincial, are being urged to deal with this possibility through restrictive legislation."
