Driver Fined \$50 In Alberton Court

ALBERTON — A Waterford resident, William Arsenault, was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days by Magistrate W. Chester MacDonald in court at Alberton yesterday, for driving a motor vehicle while disqualified from holding a license.

A second charge, operating a motor vehicle with marked gas, was adjourned to Oct. 17 on a plea of not guilty.

Charles Patrick Powers, Alberton South, pleaded not guilty to possession of 792 under-sized lobsters and the case was adjourned to Oct. 10.

Evidence was heard in the cases of Calvin Costain, St. Lawrence, and Nelson William Costain, Elmisdale RR, charged at the previous court day with possession of 467 under-sized lobsters, and both cases were adjourned to Summerside on Sept. 29.

The accused were represented by J. Watson MacNaught, QC, while the case for the Crown was conducted by William Reddin.

Ivan Timothy McKie, Greenmount, was fined \$10 and costs for driving without a license and Kenneth Earl Wells, Brookley, was fined \$10 and costs for operating an improperly equipped vehicle and an additional \$10 and costs for driving without due care and attention.

For driving while impaired Wilfred Richard, Tignish, was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days.

Productivity, Trio Coming From Sweden

OTTAWA (CP) — Three top advocates of labor-management-government co-operation have been invited to Canada for private, informal talks next month with leading union, business and government officials. It was learned Wednesday.

The three men — all from Sweden — will take part in a one-day conference on industrial co-operation to be held here Oct. 9 under government auspices.

The Swedish leaders are: Arne Geijer, president of the Confederation of Swedish Trade Unions known as LO, and also president of the International Confederation of Free Trade Unions, which represents the labor movement of the non-Communist world.

Bertil Kugelberg, president of the Swedish Employers' Confederation and top spokesman for Swedish business and industry.

Ernst Michanek, secretary of state in the Swedish ministry of social affairs, labor and housing, equivalent of a deputy minister in Canada, as well as a former chairman of the governing body of the International Labor Organization.

Canadian participating in the conference will be labor and business leaders as well as senior civil servants from such, federal departments as trade, finance and labor.

The trio was asked to come here after the National Productivity Council sent a special mission to Europe to find out how and why Europeans operate within a climate of mutual co-operation between labor and management.

Public release of the report of this mission to Europe is expected to be made just before the conference.

A reliable source said Canada's main labor and business organizations have been asked to send representatives to the conference.

The invitation list includes the Canadian Labor Congress, which recently pulled its president, Claude Jodoin, off the National productivity council.

Mr. Jodoin said the council should be replaced by a broader economic advisory council which would assist the government in economic policy planning.

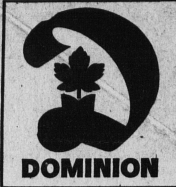

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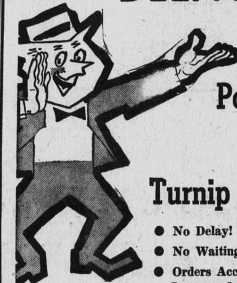
