

Tourist Experts Suggest Full Survey Of Industry

OTTAWA (CP)—A committee of Canadian tourist experts Tuesday suggested a "complete and comprehensive" economic survey be made of Canada's tourist industry. The survey, to cost some \$40,000, would be the first of its kind in Canada.

The committee was formed at last year's annual federal-provincial conference to consider the feasibility of a study to estimate the importance of the tourist industry to Canada. Its recommendation that the survey be started was made at the 11th annual conference held in Toronto.

Committee chairman Rex E. Grose, Manitoba's deputy minister of industry and commerce, said the survey will take from 18 to 20 months to complete.

The \$40,000 bill would be divided up as follows: The provinces would pay \$17,000, the Canadian government travel bureau \$15,000 and the Canadian tourist association \$8,000.

The provinces and the CTA have

agreed to the plan.

D. Leo Dolan, director of the federal travel bureau and chairman of the conference, said it is an excellent idea but he would have to confer with Resources Minister Lesage before committing the federal government.

Mr. Grose was named to head a committee to put the survey into operation when federal approval is forthcoming. It would be conducted by a private survey firm working with the bureau of statistics.

The committee report said: "It is expected a proposed survey of the plant, equipment and transportation facilities involved in the tourist industry in the light of information obtained concerning travel and expenditure patterns, promotional activities and opinion of tourists would indicate some of the characteristics of successful tourist areas of various types."

"Some examination of present promotional efforts would also be made. Finally it is hoped that suggestions and comments would

be made about policies relevant to the survey and the increase of tourism."

ASK TV TIME
 Earl Clark director of Industrial and tourist promotion for Nova Scotia, suggested that the CBC could give each of the provinces free television time to tell of their culture, history and recreation.

W. J. Dunlop, the CBC's supervisor of institutional broadcasts, said he would raise the matter with corporation executives.

Mr. Clark suggested each province conduct hour-long programs on their own particular cultures.

H. S. Robinson, an assistant director of the government travel bureau, said that almost 10 per cent of the 420,470 United States tourists who visited Canada in 1955 were attracted here by films.

Mr. Robinson said these Americans spent \$22,000,000 in Canada, while the federal, provincial and other travel promoting sponsors "have spent a conservative figure of \$1,500,000 in production of 145 (film) subjects."



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Impaired Drivers Fined \$100 Each

Teachers Hold Workshop At Alberton High

A well attended teachers' workshop was held at the Alberton High School Nov. 22nd with Miss Estelle Bonness presiding.

The Alberton group were very happy to welcome a large delegation from the O'Leary workshop.

Miss Bonness brought an encouraging report from the Board of Governors' meeting held Nov. 17th at Charlottetown. In an informative talk she pointed out that children are a country's greatest asset; they are entitled to the best possible education. A country with a high level of education makes the greatest pro-

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gress. At present Prince Edward Island is lagging behind other Provinces in educational expenditures and the people should be aroused to the necessity of providing a good education for all.

The teachers feel that a royal commission should be appointed to enquire into the shortage of professionally trained teachers and inadequate salaries.

Working teachers may improve their education by short courses, taking evening classes at High School centres, correspondence courses and workshops.

At the close of the meeting Mrs. Earle Atkinson moved a vote of thanks to Miss Bonness, seconded by Mrs. Harold Doyle and extended by Mr. Earle Jelley.

McNeill and Norman Macdonald, was a draw.

The secretary, Mrs. Art Clark, gave a report on the Atlantic Home and School Association conference held in Amherst on October 19, 20. She said that Mrs. G.E. Taylor gave a stimulating address, stressing the need of keeping pace with trends in education. She said parents should take an interest in school finances teacher shortage and other similar problems. Dr. Campbell of Woodstock, N.B. gave an address on "The Exceptional Child".

It was pointed out by Mr. Allison MacLean and the chairman, who also attended the convention, that there were now some 300,000 members of the Home and School across Canada. If the organization spoke with one voice, it would be the greatest voice in Canada, greater even than that of the trade unions.

Mrs. Keith Hobson introduced the Canadian Home and School Magazine to the gathering, commenting on its interesting and informative articles on education.

A panel discussion chaired by Mr. Francis McNeill was held dealing with the present high school curriculum, its good features and inadequacies. The members of the association outside the panel took an active part in the discussion.

At the conclusion of the meeting lunch was served in the High School home economics' room.

Engineer Found Dead In Berth

An inquest to inquire into the cause of death of Carl Saint Clair Fader, chief engineer of the Fisheries patrol boat "Cygnus" who was found dead in his berth on board ship at Holman's wharf early Tuesday morning, was held yesterday morning at eleven o'clock when a coroner's jury was empanelled by Dr. W.E. Callaghan with Chief of Police Peter R. White conducting the preliminary investigation.

The jury assembled on board ship to view the remains and adjourned to the call of the coroner pending a decision as to whether an autopsy will be performed.

The deceased was apparently in good health the previous night and according to the captain of the "Cygnus" had not complained in any way during the previous day of feeling ill. When summoned to breakfast Tuesday morning he did not respond and a doctor was summoned who pronounced him dead.

Rotary Told Effective World Government Is Need Today

Albert Rakovski spoke to the Rotary Club of Summerside Tuesday on the United Nations. The speaker expressed his appreciation of the hospitality he had been receiving throughout the Maritime Provinces and especially in Prince Edward Island. Maritimers, he said, are fortunate in many ways. They do not have the hustle and strain that people in the more populated areas have to contend with and are able to live a more orderly life. The conditions which we take for granted are much more appreciated by the immigrant than by the native Canadian.

In respect to international affairs, the speaker pointed out that Canada during the past ten years has been playing a more important part, and this was very evident during the recent debates at the United Nations where Canada led the world in advocating an international police force be sent to the Middle East.

"Our future", he said, "is that of the world, lies in recognizing law and order. We have the best system of government known to mankind and this system has to be extended to all nations until there is a world executive of nations, supported by a force willing and able to keep order. While governments can subscribe to such an organization, it will never become effective until it meets the support of the people, both spiritual and material. To survive the present crises there must be a unity of purpose, first within the nation, and then throughout the world."

President Vaughan Groom acted as chairman of the meeting and expressed the appreciation of the club to Mr. Rakovski. Chairman Vaughan also introduced as guests, Dr. George Fisher, president of the Charlottetown Rotary Club, Dr. James Higgins of Charlottetown, and F.O. Bullock of Summerside R.C.A.F. Station.

He was discharged in 1946 when he took up permanent residence in Freeland and Summerside from 1950-1953. He returned to the R.C.A.F. Summerside as a civil servant.

He leaves to mourn his passing his wife, Velma M. Bendisen, Summerside, two daughters, Mrs. Thorild Jensen (Helen); Mrs. Sven Erik Svensen (Lillian); one brother Robert; three sisters, Lena Millie and Ulla, all of Copenhagen, Denmark.
