Graduates Sold Of Confederation Bldg.

The selling for the new Fisher's of Confederation building and new building and old will serve to complement one another, Dr. Eric R. Arthur told the graduating class of Prince of Wales yesterday during convocation.

Dr. Arthur is a professor of architecture at the University of Toronto and advisor to the Confederation Memorial Building project.

The valuetory was given by Alan MacLean, Borden Societies' general manager. Hon. L.G. Dewar, minister of education, Lieutenant-Governor F. Walter Boyd, Premier Walter H. Shaw, Deputy Mayor Walter Cox, Mrs. J.A. Sullivan, rector of St. Dunstan's University, Dr. G.D. Steel, and Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister of education.

Speaking about the design of the new memorial building, Dr. Arthur said that although many people would think the building should have a slightly

Victorian look about it, it was clear to him that the winning design must not be of a type that has been gathering dust for the last hundred years.

He said that Charlottetown is fortunate in not having towering skyscrapers that dwarf the smaller but more significant buildings around them.

"In all the old provinces we have a heritage of buildings that are all too vulnerable to fire and progress, and public interest is rarely aroused for the preservation of what is left," Dr. Arthur said.

He said he was impressed with the design of many buildings in the older sections of the city, despite the fact that they had been made a study of the street architecture of Maritime towns. He said the study revealed there are lessons of history to be seen in a town like Charlottetown as well as in London or Boston.

PRINCIPAL'S ADDRESS
In the principal's address to the students, Dr. Frank MacKinnon said the students should remember that the mind of an educated man is like a piano; it is not a machine that can be turned on and best users have turned it out, its value still depends on the player.

He emphasized the one weakness of a convocation, that is, the idea is created that study is finished. He emphasized that any profession or occupation, and life itself, requires constant study and intellectual exercise.

Dr. MacKinnon stressed his appreciation of the efforts of the faculty of the college during the year. He also touched briefly on the achievements of the late Dr. Lily H. Seaman.

Dr. MacKinnon touched on the high lights of the year, foremost of which was the opening of Montague Hall. He spoke briefly on the college athletic programs and noted that many of the best college athletes also were high in academic standing.

Of particular note, he said, were the cultural activities of the year, including the visit of Graham Gillies and his company, The Canadian Opera Company, The Baroque Trio and Dr. Norman MacKenzie, president of University of British Columbia, who gave the annual Roberton Memorial Lecture, and External Affairs Minister Green who spoke at the college United Nations Club.

Air Fares Boost Is Now Delayed
OTTAWA (CP) — Increased air fares out of Canada, originally announced for June 1, will not take effect then, a spokesman for the Air Transport Board said Friday.

The International Air Transport Association announced the increase earlier this week, reflecting the new value of the Canadian dollar. The increase would apply to all trans-ocean flights out of Canada.

The increase hinged on approval by the ATB, and the spokesman said the board has requested more details.

Under the proposed rates a Montreal-London economy class flight will cost \$494.30. The present rate is \$437.30.

Turo Holstein Heifer Sale Has Average Price Of \$310

A consignment sale of 42 preferred Holstein heifers sold at Turo, N.S., last Saturday, for an average price of \$310.

The animals were consigned by 18 Nova Scotia, five New Brunswick, and five Prince Edward Island breeders and were purchased by 16 buyers in Nova Scotia, five buyers from New Brunswick and one buyer from Newfoundland.

The highest buyer of the day was Halifax County Home, Halifax, which purchased six head for \$235, with C. Langard, Bishops Falls, Nfld., runner-up, having purchased five head for \$195.

The top bred heifer, consigned by Warden, Dorchester Penitentiary, Dorchester, N.B., was purchased by Lewis Grant, Milford Station, N.S. for \$320, with the second highest priced bred heifer also consigned by Warden, Dorchester Penitentiary, purchased by Guy Waite, Martin Bridge, N.S. for \$310.
