THE ABYSSINIAN EXPEDITION.

THE Atlantic Telegraph has brought us the gratifying and important intelligence that the main object of the great military expedition into Abyssinia has been attained. A short time after Theodore, through the force of arms, had become king of Abyssinia, there happened to be a number of British subjects in that country, one of whom was a Consul sent thither by the British Government to endeavor to negotiate a commercial treaty with the Abyssinians.

Thus the object of the Abyssinian expedition has been attained. It may be premature, but we feel inclined to ask, is this all? Will Britain make use of the advantages and opportunities she now possesses, for the civilizing of that much neglected and despised people? If she does, the Abyssinian expedition will incidentally be the commencement of a new era in the history of Africa.

To expect anything like an immediate radical or even perceptible change, among such a number of people, scattered over such an extent of country, would be utopian. But all necessary changes or revolutions, however great, are hastened by propitious circumstances. And it is thought by intelligent travellers that a commercial intercourse, firmly established between them and the civilized countries of Europe, would be one of the surest precursors of the amelioration of Africa, both socially, morally, and politically.

NEW DOMINION TARIFF.

OUR readers will observe in our news summary, that an important alteration has been made in the Tariff of the New Dominion. A duty of Fifteen Dollars per head upon Horses, when added to the cost of transport thither from this Island, will operate seriously against the interests of those engaged in the trade.

The Steamer Princess of Wales made her first trip for the season, to this port, on Saturday last. Captain Evans was heartily welcomed and cordially entertained by a few of his friends. The appearance of the boat is very much improved. The time of her arrival here, for the present, will be on Tuesday and Friday, at noon, from Charlottetown, and on Wednesday and Saturday, about 1 p. m., from Shediac.

On Tuesday last the boat landed about 596 barrels flour and cornmeal, for this place. She took away for St. John about 40 sheep, 6 horses, 25 head cattle, and a lot of oysters and eggs.

Messrs. John Costan and John O'Neill, have been appointed Preventive Officers and Land Waiters, for this Port, in addition to those already serving.

Many Farmers have commenced to plough and sow. One person in Free-town, we hear, has a piece of wheat above the ground. The scarcity of seed, or of money to buy it, is being very much felt in some parts of the Island. The timely aid afforded by the Government deserves praise.

M. P. Ryan, an Irish Roman Catholic merchant, was elected without opposition to serve in Parliament, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the Hon. D'Arcy McGee.

A Canadian Steamer arrived at Shediac yesterday having on board six thousand barrels of flour. We learn that she purposes calling into Charlottetown on her way to Pictou.

There was no Colonial mail received here by steamer yesterday, and we are therefore deprived of the latest news. "Farmer's" letter, treating on Beer & Sons new Mowing Machine, will appear next week.

The conduct of the gang of boys who assembled on the wharf on Tuesday last, on the arrival of the steamer, was most shameful. We are sure that the parents of some whom we recognized know nothing of the bad conduct of their children when away from them. We would advise all parents to try and keep their boys off the wharf, for an example will most assuredly be made of some of them if they are again caught at such acts as breaking heads of barrels, throwing stones, swearing, &c.

On Wednesday evening, the 29th ult., the Rev. W. W. Colpitts, of Margate, delivered a very able lecture, occupying an hour and a half, on "The New Version" of the Bible. At the close an animated discussion followed, and was maintained to a very late hour.—Com.

Thomas Duncan, with a very appropriate and kind address, accompanied with a purse containing the handsome sum of one hundred pounds, in view of his approaching departure from among them to visit his paternal home, in Scotland. This act on the part of that congregation, speaks louder than words of the love and fellowship existing between them and their Minister, who has now for upwards of twelve years been "breaking the bread of life" to that people.

The reverend gentleman made a suitable acknowledgment for the gift and address. We wish him a safe journey and a pleasant time during his sojourn in his native land.
