REV. J. G. T. MOODY, D. D., rector of Trinity Church, Yarmouth, N. S., died suddenly at his residence on the 18th inst. He was probably the oldest clergyman in the Diocese of Nova Scotia. ONE of the lamps on board the "Charlottetown" set fire to the roof of the car during the trip from Summerside last evening. The fire was promptly extinguished before much damage was done.

GILBERT, the Moncton lawyer who shot at Policemen Thibideau, has been committed for trial by the Supreme Court, but was admitted to bail for his further appearance, himself in \$1,000 and three sureties, \$500 each. SIMON LEBLANC, who lives in French Village near Moncton, is the champion bear killer of New Brunswick so far. This week he has captured two, one weighing 520 pounds. He has killed seven bears in all this year.

An Effect of the Morrice Failure. PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 20. The paper of the St. Croix Cotton Mill went to protest yesterday. The cause is said to be the failure of D. Morrice, of Montreal.

The New Atlantic Cable. LONDON, Oct. 20. The Mackay, Bennett cables are nearly completed, and will be laid between Ireland and Nova Scotia. They will be laid by steamer "Faraday" in the early part of next summer.

Jumping the Track. NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 20. A construction train jumped the track yesterday. Ten men were wounded, three fatally.

Lord Coleridge. WASHINGTON, Oct. 20. Lord Coleridge visited the United States Supreme Court yesterday.

Fire. ST. GEORGE, Oct. 20. Five buildings, including the Post and Telegraph Offices, were burnt here yesterday. Loss is about \$10,000.

Hanged. MINROE, Ga., Oct. 20. Taylor Priant, colored, was hanged yesterday for rape upon a white woman. COLHORN, Ga., Oct. 20. Margaret Harris, colored murderess, was hanged yesterday in the presence of 4,000 people.

Canadian News Notes. OTTAWA, Oct. 20. Musson, the absconding city cashier of Montreal, has left a discrepancy of \$2,900 in his accounts. Taylor, Robertson, & Co., wholesale hatters and furriers, of Montreal, have assigned for \$80,000.

Next Saturday the Official Gazette will contain a proclamation appointing Thursday, 8th of November, a day of General Thanksgiving. A Montreal gentleman interested in the cotton trade says the outlook is very gloomy.

MAKING IT LIVELY FOR LOBSTER PACKERS.—The Inspector of Fisheries for Nova Scotia has been making it lively for lobster packers, recently having imposed a fine of \$100 on one McDonald, of Argyle, in Yarmouth County, for packing in close season; and a few days ago he put a \$200 fine on a son of the late Mayflower man at Ingonish, C. B., for a very aggravated offence, and Baker paid over.

THERE is considerable feeling manifested in Montreal because of the proviso passed through the Quebec Legislature last session that the unclaimed dead be furnished as anatomical subjects to the Medical Colleges of that Province. The St. Patrick's Church, through Father Dowd, has indignantly refused the grant under such circumstances, and the Protestant charities will do likewise.

PEACE CENTENNIAL.—A despatch from Newburg, N. Y., says:—The great peace centennial, commemorative of the American struggle for independence, occurred on the 18th. There were 100,000 visitors at Washington's headquarters. Speeches were made by Bayard and Evarts. There was a grand fireworks display and military exhibition.

THE St. John Globe says that it is reported on the streets there that the Maritime Bank of St. John will be absorbed into the Merchants' Bank of Halifax. Mr. Kenny and Mr. Duncan have been at St. John for several days, in connection, it is said, with the arrangement.

A Difference in Scales. SIR,—I beg to call your attention to a difference which exists in the scales on Pownal Wharf and the Market Scales. I bought a Barrister cold from Mr. D. W. Martin, of Brackley Point Road, for the stock farm at St. Turse, near Chambley, Que. I weighed the cold on Pownal Wharf scales, and received a ticket showing his weight to be 1,065. A gentleman having expressed doubt of the cold being so heavy, I bet a trifle that 1,065 was his correct weight. We therefore tested his weight on the market scales, and I received a ticket showing his weight to be 1,057 lbs., or eight pounds less than when weighed at Pownal wharf, ten or fifteen minutes previous. Now, as there must be something wrong, I advise those who have produce to sell by weight, to enquire which is incorrect, and have the scales adjusted before more than a trifling bit is lost.
