Allied Youth Post Shields Awarded

The two-day provincial youth conference on the alcohol problem concluded its discussions last night with a dinner in Montgomerie Hall.

The morning session in the Charlottetown YMCA yesterday was highlighted by a question period, with questions submitted beforehand and from the floor answered by a panel moderated by David Boswell. Other members of the panel were John Evans, Phil Barlow, Keith Ellwood, Everett Dorr, Mr. Dorr executive director of Allied Youth Washington, D.C. also gave an address to the group.

During the afternoon sessions held at Montgomerie Hall, David Boswell and Rev. Arthur Pendergast, parish priest, Seven Mile Bay gave addresses.

The highlight of the day came with a dinner in Montgomerie Hall last night. Head table guests were guest speaker, Dr. Malcolm Beck, director of the mental health clinic; Jack (Spy) Reedy, director of physical education, Queen Charlotte High School; Arthur Laws, executive director of the Protestant Family Service Bureau, Charlottetown; Rev. Arthur Pendergast; Mrs. Hazel MacPhee; Mrs. J. Enman; Mrs. E. Clow; Blair Macdonald; David Boswell and Russell Ewing of the mental health division.

At the meeting Mr. Boswell announced that the Bunsbury post had been chosen the most outstanding on the senior high school level and the Caledonia post for the junior high school level, Mr. Boswell said.

They are awarded on the basis of leadership, membership and the resources of the post's members. The shields have been donated by the education department's division of alcohol studies.

Mr. Boswell said the Caledonia post had made the greatest advancement in swelling the membership to promote the activities of the group. He also heaped high praise on the Bunsbury post and its sponsor Mrs. MacPhee.

Guest speaker at the banquet, Dr. Beck said "we often hear the expression of 'there is such a thing as a respectable drinker'. What this actually means is that there is such a thing as an excusable drinker. Some people think that if they drink wisely at home, it will be setting a good example for their children."

Dr. Beck continued "there are very few social drinkers in my experience who do not get drunk occasionally. Often they slip past the point of sobriety. When alcohol is the topic, one cannot deal with clear cut right or wrong, black or white. You will have to make your own decisions. There has been a large increase in teen-age drinking lately. When a young person starts to drink, there is a good chance that he may become an alcoholic in later years. When people want to drink, they do it just as easily, and with just as much a carefree air as smoking."

Aiming his remarks directly at the young people present, Dr. Beck said "adolescence is a time when we are too little to be big and too big to be little. Drinking is one way some hope to change this to the way they would like it to be. The trouble with alcohol is that society haven't made up their mind as to what to do about it."

The speaker was thanked by Mr. Boswell.

Advanced Summer Hours Effective This Weekend

Until Island residents become accustomed to the projected confusion on the time change, which becomes effective at midnight Saturday, it would be well to carry a timetable and at least two timepieces.

Residents of Charlottetown and Summerside, along with those coming into these two places to do business, will find themselves confronted with business houses operating on a variety of times.

GOV'T OFFICES

Under an order-in-council issued on April 12, all provincial government offices will open and close one hour earlier. Thus where these offices, during the fall and winter, were open for business from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday to Friday, they will for the summer operate as follows: 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. daily Atlantic Standard Time.

On the other hand Charlottetown, Summerside and most all other communities throughout the province have issued proclamations to the effect that their administrations will do business on the Advanced Summer Hours, and their clocks will be moved ahead one hour accordingly.

In the case of the banks and provincial courts and law courts offices, their hours of business are strictly governed by the Uniform Time Act, and therefore are only permitted to operate in this province on Atlantic Standard Time.

NORMAL HOURS

In the case of the offices of the prothonotary, registrar, county clerk and the judge's offices, they will continue on their

normal hours of 10: a.m. to 4:00 p.m. standard time.

All cases to be heard in both the Supreme and County Courts will be placed on the calendar on standard time. In the case of the County Magistrate, where his Monday and Wednesday courts now open at 9:30 a.m. standard, starting Monday they will open at 9:00 a.m. standard.

On Friday afternoon, his court which normally opens at 4:00 p.m. will be moved to 3:00 p.m. standard. The city police court will conform to the remainder of the offices in City Hall.

As during last year, the banking hours will be on standard time 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. standard Monday to Thursday and on Friday, 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Thus, for those persons who shift their clocks ahead, the
