Women mend clothes for the needy of world

Every Friday afternoon for the past six years members of the F. E. I. Branch of the Unitarian Service Committee of Canada have met to pack and ship clean, mended clothing for the needy in 12 countries of the world.

While not sponsored or supported by any government, the USC of Canada has been endorsed by every Prime Minister since its organization by Dr. Lotta Hitchmanov in 1945.

It is not denominational, yet supported by church peoples of all faiths. Representatives from local churches take turns at these work parties on Friday afternoons and Monday evenings.

The Unitarian Service Committee is helped by such organizations as the Women's Institute, the Queen Mary Needlework Guild, Y's Men and Menettes and Business and Professional Women's Clubs of Charlottetown and Summerside, the Rotary Club and Jaycees.

Countless individuals knit and sew for the USC, and many have adopted children under the Foster Parent scheme.

Jenkins and Sons provide transportation of the heavy cartons to the airport, and Eastern Pacific Airlines take them to waiting ships in Halifax. Generous publicity is provided by local radio, television and newspapers.

All the work is voluntary and is a fine example of what people, forgetting their differences, can accomplish together.

Queen Mary Guild holds 47th annual

The 47th annual meeting of the Queen Mary Needlework Guild held in January 1964 was the beginning of a very interesting Centennial year's work.

As usual the annual, the sewing meeting and the June display of work were largely attended, and many garments were sent to the four channels through which the Guild works—the Children's Home, the Welfare Bureau, the Queen's Box and Refugee work as well as donations to local and other charities.

The highlight of the year was in connection with the visit of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth. With other societies, the executive and charter members were given seats on the pier to welcome Her Majesty. The president attended the command performance, and at the reception on board the Britannia a representative from the Guild was questioned by Her Majesty in which she expressed much interest.

In March 1964 the Guild was again represented at the Banquet for the London Branch annual meeting and afternoon tea, when the Queen Mother received Mrs. Oscar MacCallum and the Misses Elsie and Emma Nicholson, who were present on behalf of the Charlottetown Branch as well as Miss Lillian Lewis.

Materials are purchased and a fee is paid for the work which will start later in January.

Members are most grateful that the city officials and the Centennial Committee made it possible for the Guild to be represented at last year's historical events.

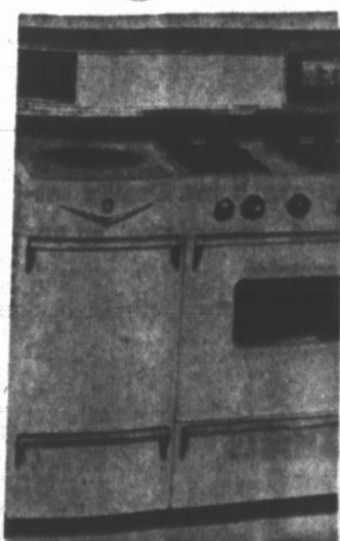

They also raised funds with cake sales, rummage sales, ice carnivals and teas.

Over the years they redecorated the nursery, when requested, and purchased sewing machines. They have also provided an incubator, a BMR machine, two wheel chairs and an anaesthetic table for the hospital. The present executive members are president, Mrs. Florence Stewart; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Marjorie Johnston and executive members are Mrs. Hilda Hitchcock and Ada MacGregor.
