

# Hifler's Berlin Hideout Still Stands Undemolished

BERLIN (REUTERS)—A new attempt is being made to demolish Hitler's Berlin hideout, which once was written off as an indestructible relic of the war.

Allied bombers, British army engineers and Berlin workmen all have failed to flatten the colossal structure, which could shelter 30,000 people at a time. But now post-war planning requires its destruction.

Hitler ordered Gustav - Nazi code name for the shelter-to be built in 1939, a few days after the war began, on a site near the Berlin zoo. The concrete and steel structure, 138 feet high and 231 feet square, was completed in 1941. Its walls were 15 feet, seven inches thick, and it boasted five elevators, a power station and a water-pumping system.

Its total cost was 42,000,000 marks about \$9,800,000 and the Nazis claimed it was the safest and largest shelter in the world.

In April, 1947, British army authorities began preparing to blow up the shelter and West Berlin authorities stripped it of its interior fittings.

British army engineers drilled 20,000 holes in the shelter walls and about 18 miles of cables were laid for the explosion. On Aug. 27, 1947, everyone living within a half-mile was evacuated. At 4 p. m., a mighty explosion shook the city. When the clouds of dust settled, the experts were amazed—the 20 tons of dynamite had done little or no damage to Gustav.

A month later, British authorities tried again, this time with 40 tons of explosive. This attempt merely scarred one of the towers.

By this time, the destruction of

Gustav had become something of a question of prestige for the British and a source of amusement to Berliners. Preparations for the third explosion went on for a whole year.

In July, 1948, after a terrific roar, a mushroom of smoke rose in the air, the roofs of nearby houses were torn off, windows were shattered in the vicinity and the nearby zoo reported extensive damage.

But Gustav still stood, a little shaken perhaps, and leaning a little to one side.

## Country Garden

I feel sure that this bed of flowers will be beautiful for weeks as they stand quite an amount of cold weather.

Chrysanthemums have been called the versatile plant because of the ease a gardener can move it from one place to another, even when blooming. More grow in the garden here than ever before and in autumn it is a wonderful flower. Now they are grown all the year round. Horticulturists, with an eye to scientific research, discovered that chrysanthemums bloom when the days are short. By controlling the light, using such simple means as shading with dark cloth, the plants bloom outdoors before frost in cold areas. Indoors, they can be flowered at any season of the year they are needed by controlling or providing light. Few flowers have better keeping qualities and the color range is amazing. So, too, is the list of varieties and flower types ranging in size from tiny, button-like flowers to huge flowers as big as inner plates.
