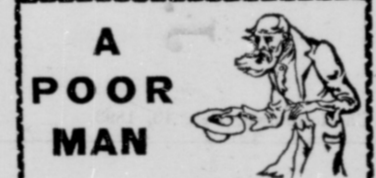

Crossing at the Capes.

The train runs right down to the pier at Tormentine and leaves travellers at the door of Tucker's hotel. The genial proprietor has just fitted up his establishment in new and tasteful style, and every comfort that the kindly heart of the hostess can suggest is supplied to the winter traveller. The great silent beam of the strait spreads its icy floor right up to the rear of the hotel, and an ice-boat is always waiting at hand.
 Before day we were all aboard, or rather, alongside our conveyance. Clearest starlight, bluish overhead, and a keen frosty chill filled the air and glittered over the fettered deep. When we were cut an hour, the sun approached the horizon and revealed the full beauty of the scene amid which we were travelling. A newly frozen stretch of water to the eastward blazed under the morning light like a sea of living flame. Around us on every hand were piled and broken masses of pure snow-white and crystal ice. Massive hummocks, twenty feet in height, fleeted with rosate and amethystine, and golden light; spires and ruined towers of crystal domes of purest marble white shadowed off with azure; caverns flashing in their depths with diamonds, arches hung with crystal stalactites; crystal, purest crystal, flaming with the morning light, was our living fairy-land here; crystal walls rising out of the deep blue wave; crystal plains of unlimited spread; hills and ranges of broken, fastung crystal, enclosed amphitheatres studded with ruined columns, more beautiful than the famed Garden of the Gods, as every fragment was purest snowy crystal. We sped over the glassy plains half borne by the breeze that filled our spread sail. We floated on the azure wave reflecting the image of spires and towers and walls of flashing icy jewelry. The wild daffia delled quietly by our side, and the killawake on snowy wing swept calmly by, wondering at our intrusion on a sanctuary sacred to him and the looting's tale. For two hours the novel beauty of the scenery kept us so wrapped in admiration that we forgot the arduousness of the journey. But when four hours were passed climbing broken ridges, tramping through snow and struggling over treacherous surfaces that broke through at every step beneath our weight, we wished that the days of primitive travel for P. E. Island were at an end, and regular railway communication established with the mainland.
 Once at Cape Traverse, the train stood ready to take the mail and travellers, and after two hours of a delightful drive among our native hills, crowned with rich deciduous groves and widespread cultivated lands, we stood once more on the trodden snowy highways of the Island metropolis.

Wedding Bells.

 On last Wednesday morning Miss Elise A. Kelly was joined in wedlock with Mr. Louis P. Drexel, of San Francisco, at the residence of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. H. Kelly, in this place, by the Rev. J. S. Ross, of Caspar.
 The wedding was attended by the members of the family and a few intimate friends. The marriage ceremony was performed in a very impressive and happy manner by the minister. After the congratulations to the bride and bridegroom, all partook of a fine collation at which sociability prevailed and all seemed to enjoy themselves very much, except the father of the bride, who was very sensibly affected by the loss of his favorite daughter. We can but blame him, for not only he but Mendocino lost one of its most gifted and estimable young native ladies, in whose future happiness all her citizens take a deep interest, but which we trust is safely reposed in the keeping of her estimable husband. The bride was the recipient of many fine and costly presents among which were conspicuous a diamond necklace, bracelets and pin by the bridegroom. The married couple left the same forenoon by the steamer Fort Arena for San Francisco, from whence they intend to proceed to the Coronada at San Diego to spend the honeymoon.

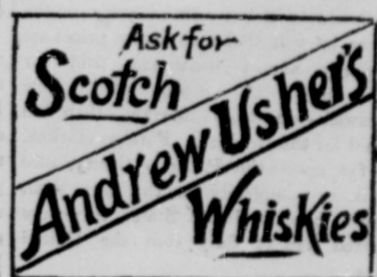
