Notes Advantages Of Grass Silage
Higher milk production at a lower cost is one of the advantages attributed to the use of grass silage which is being more widely used in this Province with the building of trench silos.
Other advantages listed are that it provides summer pasture for winter feeding, eliminates the weather hazard at haying, the aftermath provides better summer pasture and it eliminates the laborious and expensive root production. There are various types silos in use but the newly developed trench variety is apparently meeting with favor, especially in areas where good drainage is available.
Agricultural officials suggest that for the best ensilage and high yield a Red Clover - Timothy mixture should be cut when the clover is just starting to bloom. They state this occurs about June 15 and the timothy is fully in head the grass should be chopped before ensiling and a preservative added.

According to Needs
Each farmer should build his silo according to his own needs. Its size would depend on the number of cattle or the amount of grass to be ensiled. They estimate one cubic foot of silage weighs 45 pounds and that there are between five and seven tons of grass per acre on a well managed farm. To make it easier for farmers to estimate their needs it has been determined that to feed 15 cows 50 pounds each per day for 200 days requires 75 tons of silage. To hold this quantity it would be necessary to build silos 10 feet deep, 10 feet wide at the bottom and 12 feet wide at the top. One of these dimensions will hold 2 1/4 tons for every foot of its length.
The sides are sloped towards the bottom to aid in packing and to reduce the crumbling of walls. It is possible, but if it is placed against the foundation of an underground barn there is danger of the wall collapsing as a result of the pressure of the grass.
Good silage results from keeping one acre. For this purpose the silage must be tight, have smooth walls and the silage well tramped. The top of the silo should be well rounded and high in the centre. To seal the top a foot or two of old hay or straw weighted down with poles or earth should be satisfactory, of course, if they are the main thing is to keep the rain out and prevent freezing.
