POLICE COURT.—At the police court this morning, a young man was fined \$2 for assault and battery on another, on the 29th ult. George Brown, 17 years old, a well known city character, appeared charged with the larceny of two iron pots from the premises of D. U. Desbriay, Spring Park, on or about Aug. 1. Brown asked a jail named Wm. Duffy, an employe of Mrs. Desbriay, could he take one of the pots, the lad said it was of no use, and Brown took it along with another one, and sold both at the junk store. The case was dismissed.

A MAGNIFICENT TROPHY.—The trophy won by the 82nd Battalion this year in the Martini series of matches has been received here from Ottawa. It is a magnificent solid silver trophy, stands 22 inches high, and is surmounted by an officer with rifle glass in hand. The base is ornamented with cross guns, interwined with a wreath of maple leaves. A little below is another wreath of maple leaves, enclosing a gold star, and on either side of the trophy is a marksman in firing position. The trophy is mounted on a black-onyx pedestal. It was won by the 82nd Batt., who took seventh place against a field of 72 teams representing the whole Dominion. It is now on exhibition in the Richmond Street window of Messrs. Proxse Bros, and will be fired for by the members of the battalion team who won it, at Kensington range at a later date. One of the three champion badges for the highest individual score throughout the Dominion during the same series was won by Staff Sergeant M. Allen of the 82nd Battalion. We congratulate Staff-Sergt. Allen and the Battalion team on their success.

A PROTEST.—Sir,—Surely the announcement in yesterday's EXAMINER that the Government intended appointing another vendor for Charlottetown, cannot be true. We have three now, which in fact is three too many; and to appoint a fourth will be a serious blow to the temperance people. I can hardly credit that the Government would for a moment seriously consider the advisability of adding another place to obtain liquor.

TEMPERANCE.—AN APPROVAL.—Sir,—I am glad to see that the Government intend giving us another place to get our beer. We have now two drug shops where we can get all a doctor prescribes, besides a place run by a regular trader, who keeps the "best to be had in the market," and it is pleasing to know that another spot in a back street is to be legalized with a license where we will be able to get a drop now and again. We cannot have too much of a good thing! So here to the health of the

SCOTT ACT.—WARD FIVE'S VIEWS.—Sir,—The duty of the hour to vote for the Scott Act having been accomplished, one would have imagined that those who were instrumental in forcing the law on the city would have made some show to carry the stringent and prohibitory clauses of the Act in effect. This has not been done, for it is notorious that beyond appointing a couple of prosecutors, one of whom has proved a fifth wheel to the coach, nothing of a practical nature has been advanced in the temperance cause. Although we were promised everything, we have got nothing. The rum party (now gone to the lowest class) appear to have everything their own way. New shanties have been opened and run had at all hours, while the nights are lit up with the howling of drunken men. The police records, however, show a decrease in the number of arrests for the month of August, and this is the only satisfactory feature in the whole business. How it happens to be there, no one can tell. That in fact there is less drunkenness since the Scott Act came in is not asserted; and indeed, in face of one's own eyes no sane person would have the hardihood to allege a decrease. We are now, however, to have another vendor to supply the large demand that has sprung up for bottles of the ardent. Temperance is certainly on the increase with a vengeance. The temperance sentiment is growing fast.

WARD FIVE.—CITIZEN SPEAKS.—Sir,—When the citizens were invited by the temperance people of this Island, including the members of the Legislature, to meet in session, to vote for the Scott Act, they were given distinctly to understand, in fact they were guaranteed, that the law if adopted would be most vigorously enforced without respect to persons. The Act has now been law for over a month, and how far drunkenness has decreased and the Act enforced is quite apparent to every one who likes to form an opinion. It is true that there are a few prosecutions pending before the Magistrate, but instead of being tried and finished, the cases are delayed and adjourned from time to time. The streets in the meantime, are fairly alive with drunken men, and, according to police court reports, with women also, while the dens supplying the liquor are in full blast. We have, since the adoption of the Act, a Club where liquor can be had day and night, under the sanction of the courts—a Club which boasts of having for its members Senators, Members of the House of Commons, Legislators and Magistrates; and we have three licensed vendors, besides druggists who can, on doctors' orders, supply liquors if the purchaser has the money. This would, to an ordinary person, seem to be a supply enough in a temperance town. But it appears that Mr. Peter's Government intends opening another vendor's shop. As one who voted Temperance last April, I would like to know where are the pledges of the Scott Act workers and how are they being kept.

SIMPLE METHOD OF CHECKING THE ASTHMA.—Not very long ago a foreign physician recommended a very pleasant and effective means of curing short colds in the head or chest. His remedy cologne water, fifty drops of which are inhaled four or five times a day by the mouth or nose.

The New York Herald's European edition now publishes a very simple method of checking asthma, by the use of a powder, which acts in the same way as cologne water. The formula is: Powdered snuff.....5 grammes Camphor.....5 grammes Menthol.....0.15 centigr.

Another method of checking asthma, noticed favorably by foreign medical correspondents, is by rhythmic tractions of the tongue made by the patients themselves when they feel that an attack is coming on. He says: These tractions of the tongue made with the hand covered with a handkerchief eighteen to twenty times a minute, initiating the respiratory rhythm by an in and out movement, restore breathing, and may check the attack. These tractions made by an assistant may also be found efficacious during the stragulatory period of the attack.

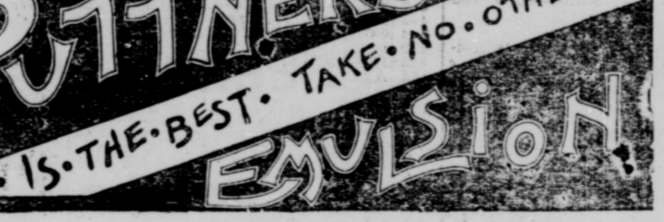
