 sums of money in dredging, repairs to wharves, harbours and breakwaters and new construction, \$382,765. The dredging of the Montague River cost \$23,000, voted this year. The new channel, now under construction at Savage Harbour, received a vote of \$156,000. Work now completed at Red Head cost over \$47,000; North Lake Harbour, when completed, will cost \$98,926; Nautrage, \$19,500; Bay Fortune, when completed, \$38,353; Graham's Pond when completed, \$786,400; Murray Harbour, \$21,000 this year; Murray Harbour North, \$35,000; Murray River, \$28,000; Georgetown, \$53,000 and at Souris, for both fishermen and farmers, on wharf, breakwater and dredging, an expenditure of approximately one and one quarter million dollars, when completed.

"Those mentioned are largely contract work. In addition, Annandale and other fishlanding harbours receive yearly day labour grants of money for repairs, dredging and additional construction. The Opposition cannot truthfully say that the interest of fishermen are being disregarded. On the other hand, the fishermen are receiving the fullest recognition. Cold storage facilities are also made available for providing bait.

**Social Security Program**  
 "Passing now to our Social Security program, in the Session of 1951, the Government passed the Old Age Security Act and the Old Age Assistance Act, replacing the former Old Age Pension Act. The Old Age Security Act makes provision for all those persons reaching the age of 70 years to receive a pension of \$40 per month, without a means test, and wholly paid for by the Federal Government. The Old Age Assistance Act includes age groups of 65 to 69, inclusive, granting pensions with a maximum of \$40 per month on a matching dollar basis with the Provinces and subject to eligibility qualifications.

In our Province, under the Social Security program, for the years 1948 to 1951, we have received from the Federal Treasury \$16,036,216 for the first full year in which the Old Age Security Act was in effect. In 1952 our Province received \$3,119,000 and the amount paid to those persons in the 65 to 69 age group for the same period was \$132,626.

**Three-Fold Grant**  
 "Family Allowances paid to our Province in the same period named by 1952 was \$2,324,056, and Blind pensions \$26,681.

"A few days ago the Minister of Health and Welfare announced that a grant of \$42,000,000, to extend over a period of five years, in three new fields of health and welfare, namely, Child and Maternal Health, Rehabilitation, Laboratory and Radiological Services. This three-fold Federal grant, when fully developed, will total almost eleven million dollars.

"Each year this grant, which will start this year at \$500,000 and double next year and the year after, will be distributed on the basis of a flat amount of \$10,000 to each Province, with the balance divided among the Provinces according to the number of births and infant deaths.

"The grant for disabled persons will be especially welcome as it will reach persons in the middle age groups who are unable to work because of physical handicaps and who up to this time were not included in welfare benefits. This grant for the disabled will total one million a year. For the first year, it will be one half this amount. There will be ten thousand and a year for each Province, with the balance divided on the basis of population.

**Memorial Hospital**  
 "The Minister of Health and Welfare informed me a few days ago that the King's County Memorial Hospital will receive a grant of \$9,500 for additional construction and that the Prisonwood Hospital will receive \$60,000. These substantial contributions on the part of the Federal Government will aid in ensuring more adequate hospital facilities for the people in our Province.

"The period of the five-year health program now concluded made available to the Provinces 165 million. The new five-year program we are now entering will make available 212 million dollars. A part of these moneys are outright grants and part are matching dollar grants to the Provinces."
