

Provincial Magistrate Hears Heavy Court Docket

GEORGETOWN — Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. presided over a busy session in Kings County court yesterday. The Crown was represented by Gordon Tweedy, Kings County Crown Prosecutor.

Michiel Jerome MacLean of DesGros Marsh, pleaded not guilty to the theft of a car fender skirt, valued at less than \$50. He was fined \$75 and costs or 30 days.

David Francis Horton, Irish, who on Tuesday was found guilty of breaking, entering and theft, was sentenced yesterday to serve 4 months in Kings County Jail.

Wilbur Lemuel Jay, Mt. Stewart, charged with having care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired had his case adjourned to November 3 to obtain counsel.

Sydney Beck, Montague, pleaded guilty to causing a disturbance at Montague Y Center by fighting, and was fined \$25 and costs.

Peter Dunstan Walsh, Georgetown, charged with unlawfully fishing for lobsters, changed an earlier not guilty plea to one of guilty, and was fined \$25 and costs. He was represented by G. R. Foster, Q.C. The Fisheries Department was represented by J. P. Nicholson, Q.C.

Gordon James Lavers, Georgetown, charged with possession of an offensive weapon for a purpose dangerous to the public peace, had his case adjourned for one week for plea and to consult with counsel.

Gordon Callum MacPherson, Flat River, who earlier had elected trial by a jury with-out a jury, yesterday re-elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty to escaping custody from Kings County Jail. He was remanded in custody for one week for sentence. Two other charges against MacPherson were withdrawn.

Olav Ivan Hendriksen of Montague, charged with the theft of pipe cuttings and brass, valued at less than \$50 the property of Bathurst Marine Ltd., was granted an adjournment to October 27. He informed the court that he is to be represented by Kenneth R. MacDonald. Hendriksen was also granted a weeks adjournment on a charge of having possession of pipe; pipe-fitting tools; welding tools, and copper pipe, knowing them to have been obtained by the commission of an offense punishable on indictment.

William Edward Bailey, Mur-

ray River, who pleaded not guilty in Justice of the Peace Traffic court to driving while his license was suspended had his case adjourned by consent to November 10 for trial.

Peter Dunstan Walsh, Georgetown, who also pleaded not guilty in Traffic court, to driving without due care and attention, had his case adjourned by consent to November 10.

A considerable number of cases under the Liquor Control Act were dealt with by the court.

to comment on any rumors or reports which have been suggesting that they were experiencing difficulties.

"Today's meeting is just a continuation of the constructive and objective analysis of the Georgetown industries where all parties to the negotiations are meeting with the same objective of seeing that Bathurst Marine and Golf Garden Foods continue their operations," the Premier commented.

Following Tuesday's meeting of cabinet, when the auditing firm held discussions with cabinet over the Georgetown situation, Premier Campbell expressed the hope these meetings will provide information to establish a base upon which the Georgetown industries may operate effectively and profitably.

GOVERNMENT CONCERNED

The Premier, at that time stated: "It is of utmost concern to the government that the Georgetown industries continue to operate and provide employment opportunities in the area, and we are determined as a government to assure the efficient operations of these industries."

While so far no official statements have been made as to what has been found or what the problems might be, it is obvious the government has been faced in recent weeks with the problem of further and heavier financial support for the two industries. The need for funds is known to be heavy and has raised questions about the feasibility of continued and expanded support.

The Fisherman's Loan Board has reportedly been having difficulty in getting a clear picture of the financial operations of the companies and has resorted to the courts to get company records.

The processing operations of Gulf Garden Foods has been investigated by Canadian Plant and Process Engineering Limited of Halifax, while Maurice R. Evans, a naval architect and consultant from Halifax has taken a look at the operations of Bathurst Marine.

ALTERNATIVES

It has been suggested that three alternatives face the government.

The first is that more government money be made available to the companies. The second would be to call a halt to further investment and take a chance of depriving 300 to 400 persons of jobs.

If the government finds that further investment is not feasible or practical and if present management cannot continue to operate under these circumstances, then the third alternative may be that the government could carry out plans for the operation of the two industries by either private or public management. This means that a Crown Corporation could be set up, top management people hired and the plants could continue to operate without interruption.
