A REMARKABLE BIRTH.—The correspondent of the Halifax Herald reports that a Mrs. Murray, of New Glasgow, N. S., gave birth to five children on the 15th inst.

THE works of the Canada Paper Company at Windsor, Que., were the scene of a startling accident on Wednesday. A boiler, weighing four tons, exploded, fatally injuring two men. The boiler was lifted over adjoining houses, and carried to a distance of over 300 feet.

A RAILWAY train from Andalusia, bound for Madrid, carrying a Government treasure chest, under charge of five gendarmes, was stopped on Sunday last by sixteen brigands, between Alcazia and Argomasilla. Marshal Serrano, who happened to be on the train, took command of the gendarmes and fired on the bandits, who fled. One gendarme was wounded.

THE London correspondent of the Daily News, St. John, says:—As soon as the impending changes in the Canadian Agency have taken place, an effort is to be made, I am informed, by the representatives of the Dominion to encourage emigration on a large scale. Two spots have been particularly pointed out as suitable places to which the steps of emigrants should be turned, one being Prince Edward Island and the other Manitoba. Grants of land are to be made under the most favorable conditions, besides assistance in regard to passage money. Arrangements will be made not only for sending out whole families, but their furniture and any animals they may think desirable to take.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

Another Horrible Attempt to Assassinate the Czar.

**CUBAN POLITICS!**

Dr. Fortin's Submarine Telegraph Contract.

Special dispatch to Examiner.

St. PETERSBURG, Feb. 18.

The mine which exploded last evening in the basement of the Winter Palace was filled with dynamite and gun powder. The train can be traced to a cellar in the inner court, where a quantity of fuel was stored.

LONDON, Feb. 18.

Various sovereigns have sent congratulations to the Czar on the escape of his Majesty and the Imperial Family from the last atrocious attempt on their lives. London and Continental journals unite in expressing horror at the plot in which it is generally believed some of the employees of the Palace were concerned. No additional details of the affair have been received.

HAVANA, Feb. 18.

Dates from the city of Mexico to the 18th inst. say that the opponents of Genl. Gonsal now claim that he is not a Mexican but a Spaniard, and is thereby disqualified for the Presidency. A number of his supporters have abandoned him.

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.

Parnell is announced to arrive here on the 11th of March. Mr. Johnston, of the Halifax Herald and the St. John Sun, in a letter to the Free Press, protests against Canada being DeWintonized.

Col. Bagot, A. D. C., the hero of the late accident, leaves for England shortly.

The Government have made a contract with the American Telegraph Company for building and operating a telegraph between Canso and Halifax, to be paid out of the appropriation made last session.

The eldest daughter of Postmaster General O'Connor died yesterday.

Yesterday Dr. Fortin, M. P., distributed among the members of the House a new edition of his submarine telegraph chart. It shows the new electro signal in operation in accordance with the international code of signals.

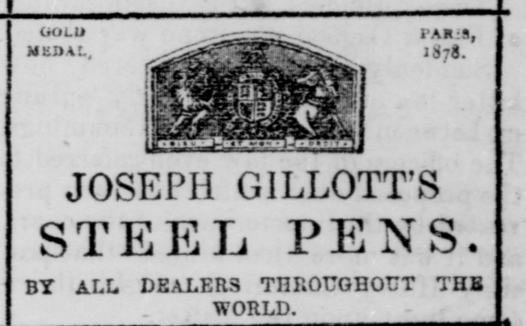
