MUSTARD GIVES THIS QUICK Chili Sauce

A PLEASING "NIP"

1 1/2 qts. canned tomatoes, or 3 lbs. ripe tomatoes
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped celery
1/4 cup chopped green peppers
4 1/2 teaspoons salt
3 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon Colman's Mustard
1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce
1/2 cup cider vinegar

If ripe tomatoes are used, peel and then chop. Combine with remaining ingredients, in order named, in a large kettle. Simmer, uncovered, 45 mins., or until quite thick.
