At yesterday's meeting it was agreed that the contractor would be permitted to complete the job meeting yesterday afternoon, attended by Civic officials and work as quickly as possible with representatives of the contracting out regard to completing a block

at a time. This agreement was reached after the contractor pointed out the importance of completing the cement work before colder weather and while temperatures are above freezing. Civic officials also learned to their satisfaction that the cement mix being used is in the proportion of one part of cement mix being used is in the proportion of one part of cement with four and a half parts of sand and gravel and the cement slab was being replaced to a depth of seven inches below street level.

The matter of ownership of broken concrete which is being excavated from the trench was settled in favor of the contractor when it was pointed out that the debris mentioned was being replaced with new material by the contractor, and on completion of this agreement a further agreement was made in which the excavated material will be sold to the town at a price of four dollars per four cubic yard truck load, and this material will be used or stock piled for use in the repairs of other streets within the town.

After discussion of the matter of a well which was being sunk of Holmans store, it was decided to abandon further drilling which had reached a depth of 60 feet. The well was being dug in an effort to find drainage for seepage of water which was causing trouble at one of the maintenance manholes which form a part of the underground cable system. The purpose of the drilling had not been accomplished when the 60-foot depth had been reached and the decision against further drilling was made in fear of worsening the situation which was causing the drainage problem.

As a result of the meeting the contractor agreed to supply platforms for motor and pedestrian traffic at intersections and cross streets where excavation work is in progress.

The town of Summerside was represented at yesterday's meeting by Mayor W.A. Currie, councillors Andrew Perry, W.E. MacAusland, E.M. Cannon and town manager Joseph Brophy.

The contracting firm of Morrison and MacRae was represented by T.D. Morrison and D.R. Morrison, and the Island Telephone Company was represented by E.G. Cameron, plant superintendent of the Island Telephone Company at Charlottetown and Earl Smith, maintenance foreman with the Telephone Company at Summerside.
