Montague In 1898 A Busy Shipping Centre

An interesting article on shipping at Montague during October, 1898, was recently displayed at The Guardian Office, Montague. Taking from a half-century-old issue of The Guardian, it gives evidence of the fact that Montague was at that time a very busy shipping centre. This activity on Montague's water front lasted until the early 1930's when produce began to move by rail, and later by truck. It is estimated that where one ship puts into port in the Spring and Fall now, ten ships appeared at the turn of the century. As it appeared in the display, the article read as follows:

was moved that the building committee be empowered to hire a capable man to perform this work.

It was moved that the appointment of town assessors be left to the discretion of the finance committee.
