Hayman Calmly Confident Of Argos Future Success

Canadian Press Sports Editor Law Hayman doesn't panic when he surveys the wreckage of Toronto Argonauts. "Why," he started out a count away back in the 1930s and ended this phase of his career in 1949 with a record of coaching five Grey Cup champions. Since then he's been on the administrative end of the game.

He has possibly found things bright about the future for a club that hasn't made it to the East-West Cup final since 1937. And what is necessary to make Argonauts a contender, at least in his own conference?

High spirits or frustration, temper or impatience, whatever the cause the National Hockey League is going through some rough times, literally.

Elbows cocked, 2nd sticks held high, the clubs square off for a four-game weekend schedule after a week in which they piled up three hours and 35 minutes of collective penalties.

The week's tally included 73 Chicago penalties, seven majors and three misconducts. In addition, the first penalty shot of the season was awarded in New York Sunday against Jean Beliveau of Montreal Canadiens after he tripped Ranger Don Marshall on a breakaway (Marshall missed).

Montreal Canadiens take on New York Rangers at the same time with Gilles Tremblay and Billy Hicke sidelined by wounds sustained in Thursday's brawl with the Hawks, which featured 10 minors and two majors.

Tremblay's check was fractured by an elbow Jack and Hicke wound up with a concussion and a 12-stitch head gash when he was dumped into the boards by Chicago's Bobby Hull.

Chicago also suffered a casualty in Thursday's conflict defenseman Wayne A Hillman flew to Chicago and underwent hospital treatment Friday for a knee injury.

Maple Leafs, struggling in third place behind Chicago and Montreal while Detroit presses from behind in the league race, lead the circuit in the deprivation that both reflects and feeds frustration — penalties. They have amassed 203 minutes in penalties—83 minutes in the last two contests — from 10 games. That means Leafs have been minus a man on average for more than one period of each game.

Chicago stands second in the penalty toll with 189 minutes, but Hawks have played 12 more games. The league as a whole has rolled up 969 minutes in 68 games. New York has the cleanest record with 108 minutes in a dozen games.

The Black Hawks rampage—eight wins, three draws and a single loss a month ago in Detroit — has prompted even Toronto coach Punch Imlach to predict that Chicago will end up on top next spring—"If they keep on using Stm Mikita and Bobby Hull the way they have."
