Georgetown Lady Passes In 100th Year

The death occurred at her home in Georgetown on Thursday Oct. 20 of Mrs. Mary Ann Johnson in her 100th year. The late Mrs. Johnson was born Mary Ann Allen, Boughton Island, Dec. 24, 1855, and took up residence in Georgetown in 1882 at the age of 27 years. At the time of her death she was Georgetown's oldest citizen, loved and respected by all who knew her. She possessed in abundance and practiced in her daily life the Christian virtues of faith, charity and love of neighbour, always seen in good in all. She was always interested in what was taking place in the community and surrounding country. And being the possessor of a fine memory she was an exceptionally interesting conversationalist on the many changes that had occurred during her long lifetime which covered all on the part of the reigns of six sovereigns. Her husband, the late Charles Johnson predeceased her in 1923. Left to mourn her passing are four daughters: Margaret (Mrs. A. W. Allen) Georgetown; Martha (Mrs. William White), Borden; Miriam (Mrs. James MacKenzie), San Francisco, California; Florence (Mrs. Y. Jenkins) Georgetown. Also three sons: Joseph F., Georgetown, Nathan, San Francisco; St. John, N. B. The funeral will be held at Georgetown on Saturday, with service at the home at 2:30 p.m. and at Holy Trinity Anglican Church at 3 p.m.

MRS. NORMAN MACLAREN
There passed peacefully away in the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Saturday, Oct. 1st, 1955, Mrs. Norman MacLaren in her 74th year. In failing health for some time, Mrs. MacLaren suffered a stroke, was removed to hospital but her condition gradually became more serious until on the above date she passed away. The late Mrs. MacLaren was born at St. Peter's North, the daughter of the late Crawford and Rowena (Garrett) Hayden, and after her marriage to Norman MacLaren left the island in 1923 to live in Monson, Mass. There they lived up to the present time. As frequently as was possible, she returned to visit her island home and loved ones of her family, and in later years in spite of failing sight and poor health she still made her visits to P. E. I. Of a quiet and unassuming nature, she devoted herself to family and friends and bore her illness and loss of sight with uncomplaining patience. She will be sadly missed by those who were near and dear to her. She was a life-long member of St. Peter's United Church. Many lovely floral tributes bore silent testimony to the sympathy of her many friends. She leaves to mourn her husband and one grandson, Robert Holmes of Monson, Mass., and four brothers: Walter, St. Peter's North; Arthur of Montreal; Edward of B.C.; and William of Southfield's, Eng. Her only daughter, Mildred, Mrs. Clarence Holmes, predeceased her in 1934. Her funeral was held on Oct. 5th from the home of her brother Walter and was largely attended. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. R. A. MacLeod, St. Peter's, and Rev. J. M. Sproule, York. The hymns sung were, "I Hear Thy Welcome Voice", "Nearer My God To Thee", and "The Lord's My Shepherd". The men's quartet of the congregation sang "In The Sweet Bye and Bye." Pall bearers were G. C. Pratt, Harold Lewis, John J. MacKinnon, Lloyd Anderson, Irvy MacKenzie and W. M. Lewis. Interment was in Midgell Cemetery.

Beaverbrook Painting Leads To Case In Court

NEW YORK (CP)—A New York woman who owned an old master by Fragonard only to lose it in an apparent swindle is involved in a court battle to recover \$45,000 from the company which insured the painting, "Portrait of a Young Girl." It now is in the possession of British publisher Lord Beaverbrook, and he says he intends to keep it. He is not directly involved in the lawsuit. Mrs. Florence Dickerman, of New York's fashionable Fifth Avenue, filed suit against the Mutual Insurance Company for \$45,000 last Sept. 29. The company had insured the painting for that amount. Wednesday Justice Thomas A. Aurelio adjourned until Nov. 9 hearing on the motion in the state Supreme Court. RETURNED IMITATION In her suit, Mrs. Dickerman said she commissioned Anthony Seaton, an art dealer who died last year, to sell the painting. But he "converted it to his own use" and subsequently returned an imitation to the High School, who has given sound advice and many helpful suggestions, thus contributing much to the success of this first edition.
