**To Discuss Food Controls**

OTTAWA, Nov. 16—(CP)—Agriculture Minister Gardiner said that he has arranged to meet Lord Woolton, Britain's cabinet spokesman on food and agriculture, in London next week to discuss food controls.

He told the Commons he is sure that Canada and the United Kingdom can resume where they left off in the matter of food controls when the Conservatives went out of office in the U. K. after the war.

His statement was an amplification of his announcement Monday night that he plans to discuss food sales with officials of Britain and other countries at the current Rome meeting of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization. He leaves for Rome Monday.

Mr. Gardiner made the statement in reply to a suggestion by Hazen Argue (C. C. F.—Assiniboia) that he discuss the possibility of a large market for Canadian farm products with Prime Minister Churchill, when the British leader visits Ottawa in January.

**The Oxford Atlas**

Special feature of the recently published "Oxford Atlas" is a 24-page section of the Americas, with its own index-gazetteer. Of these 12 are devoted wholly or in part to Canada.

Maps deal with population, vegetation, structure, land use and economic development. While political boundaries are clearly marked, physical features have determined page areas. Thus, one double page map covers the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence River basin and their surrounding land masses.

All maps have been newly drawn, and a special process of layer-tints employed to depict contours and elevations. The 50,000 place names are all hand-lettered. Production of the atlas took five years and was directed by Sir Clinton Lewis, former surveyor-general of India.

Greater accuracy than ever before in reproducing the earth's curved surface on flat pages has been achieved by using five different projections.

Published by Oxford University Press, the Atlas is intended chiefly for students of geography, but at the same time it is an efficient reference book for any geographical purpose.
