## Dalhousie Students' Council Pays Final Share Of Pledge

The largest financial undertaking in the history of any Students' Council at Dalhousie University has ended with the handing over of a cheque for \$3,773.49 to Dr. A.E. Kerr, President of the University, in full payment of a pledge made by the students eight years ago. The money constitutes the unpaid amount pledged by Dalhousie students in March 1950 as part of a \$10,000 pledge to aid in the construction of the Dalhousie Memorial Rink.

Council President, Murray Fraser, handed the cheque over to Dr. Kerr and Brig. H.V.D. Iaing, Chairman of the Board of Governors of Dalhousie, stating that the students felt pleased and relieved at having fulfilled their moral obligations to the University.

The money, to pay off the balance of the pledge, resulted from the acknowledgment of services collected from previous Council pledges and originally slated for investment along with other investments currently being held by the students' Council. Mr. Dave Matheson, Vice-President of the Council explained that the payment had now wiped out the last major obstacle in the path of plans currently being studied by the Council toward the possible eventual construction of a Students' Union Building on the Studley campus.

A report dealing with the feasibility of the construction of such a building, along with other recommendations is to be made to the Council, February the 15th.

Since 1950, date of the original pledge, a student organization known as the "Rink Rats" succeeded in raising \$4,226.51 by means of musical reviews, dances, raffles, and operation of various canteens with all of the net proceeds going into the Rink Fund.

The "Rink Rats" organization has now been dissolved.
