

Stanhope Beach Ass'n Hopes For Golf Course

The new wild life park at North Rustico, adjacent to the National Park, was the subject of the address given by Charles Bartlett, to Monday night's meeting of the Stanhope Beach Development Association, held at the Charlottetown Hotel.

In his address Mr. Bartlett, owner and operator of the park, outlined the work he accomplished in setting up the project, and what his hopes are for future expansion.

At the business session, held after the dinner, president, Wilson Ross, revealed that there are high hopes that the proposed golf course will be established at Stanhope, with the assistance of both the federal and provincial governments.

He estimated that the cost of such a project, complete with clubhouse and pro shop would be in the vicinity of \$200,000.

An announcement was also made that the association this summer plans to set up and operate a second tourist information booth at Stanhope. The organization for the past two years has operated out of the Charlottetown Hotel.

The association is also having a completely new brochure printed and will be distributed in the vicinity of the park.

Mr. Ross said that there is a strong possibility that two new fishing ponds will be provided for the area, and plans for these are well underway.

Speaking of the prospects of the organization, Mr. Ross said it is amazing what can be accomplished when people get together to work on a co-operative basis.

Health Nursing Department.

At 3 p.m. Dr. J.H. O'Hanley, C.M., Paediatrician, Charlottetown, will speak on "The P.E.I. School Child", and Dr. M.N. Beck will talk on "Mental Health in Children".
