Thick Ice Chokes River's Entrance

MONTREAL (CP)—Thick ice has choked up the entrance to the St. Lawrence River, cutting any hope that the first overseas vessel will reach Montreal by Friday.

The German freighter Volumnia has been pinned in the Cabot Strait area since early Saturday. She is waiting for help from icebreakers before edging further into the icefields that trapped her briefly Saturday.

Meanwhile, the British freighter Manchester Mariner radioted Sunday she was 300 miles behind the Volumnia and rapidly narrowing the gap. Montreal agents for the Volumnia said that at least four days will be needed for the vessel to travel from her present position to her wharf here. The Volumnia and the Manchester Mariner are the only Montreal-bound ships reported from the area.

ITALIAN FREIGHTER

The Italian freighter Maria Fausta G. has not been heard from and is believed somewhere off the coast.

Meanwhile, the 6,000-ton icebreaker Labrador was forced to head for Halifax for repairs after she was holed above the water line by the British freighter Baskerville.

The Labrador was helping to guide the Baskerville through to Dalhousie, N.B. when the mishap occurred. There were no injuries. The Baskerville was escorted back out of the ice field and is waiting for another attempt to be made by the icebreaker N.B. McLean.

Once through the ice fields, the ships' path is expected to be relatively free of ice and little trouble is expected in the river. A channel has been kept clear since mid-January and three icebreakers are patrolling the channel to smash shore ice that breaks off.

DeGaulle Warned By Tass Agency

LONDON (AP)—Tass warned French President de Gaulle Saturday that "a devastating rebuff" would follow any attack on Soviet troops in the Berlin area.

The official Soviet news agency accused de Gaulle of trying to "heat-up" the Berlin crisis by providing "grist to the mill of those who would like to poison the international atmosphere."

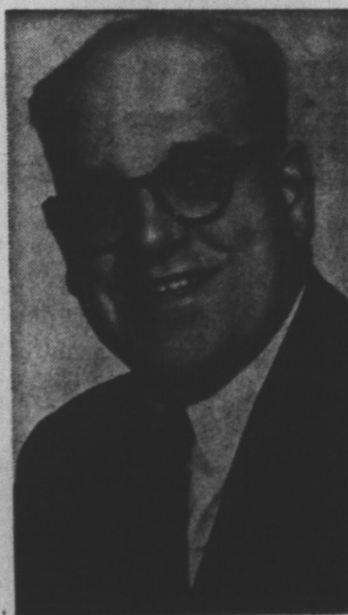

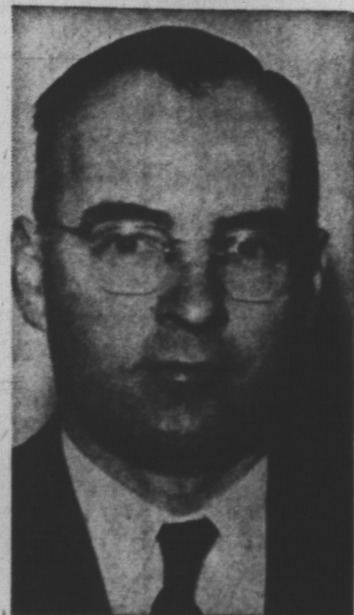
