DON'T BE TOO SURE.

Those who oppose the Pineau-Farquharson Administration in the second district are very confident of victory on Wednesday next. This confidence is good. But we advise every man who desires to rebuke the Government for its gross offences to be on the qui vive and to vote early on Wednesday. Mr. Farquharson and his legions will put forth every effort of which they are capable. This is Farquharson's battle; and it will be Farquharson's victory if his doctor-candidate should be elected.

We hear that several "supervisors" in the district, and other workers for the Government party were in town yesterday receiving their "ammunition" for use in the contest. Those who are determined to elect the farmer candidate will do well to be active on election day. If they should fail to obtain a decisive majority for Mr. Wise, the result will be due to "taking it easy" on account of over confidence. Don't be over-confident.

OUR MEN AT OTTAWA.

The newspaper correspondents at Ottawa have taken the weight of our representatives at Ottawa. One of them writing on the 3rd inst., says:—

"Among the members who can afford to be 'not void of righteous self-applause' is Mr. Martin of Prince Edward Island. Mr. Martin is not a son of thunder, like Sir Louis Davies, and cannot say so many words in a minute as the knight. But he is a most persistent man and has not that splendid gift of infinite inaccuracy that characterizes the minister of marine. When they get down to a discussion of an election act applying to Prince Edward Island, Mr. Martin submits to a good deal of vociferation and a certain measure of contemptuous setting aside at the hands of the minister. Sir Louis assumes a knowledge of all the law points and familiarity with the local situation. But in the end Mr. Martin comes up calmly with the facts Sir Louis ignores or misrepresents, and with the law, which the minister invariably gets wrong and usually misquotes. At the very end the solicitor general who has charge of the bill discovers the lapses of his colleague and good naturedly accepts the amendment which Sir Louis has been denouncing or holding up to ridicule.

"By some such process Mr. Martin and Mr. Macdonald have succeeded in incorporating somewhere between a dozen and a score of amendments applying to Prince Edward Island, out of a larger number that were prepared by Senator Ferguson on Senator Prowse and themselves. Yesterday, for instance, they succeeded in imposing a penalty on the returning officer who should refuse an eligible vote. As it stood there seemed to be no punishment for the refusal to accept such a vote, which is somewhat important, inasmuch as they have no election lists on the Island and the deputy returning officer seems to have the largest kind of authority to say whether a man may vote or not. Sir Louis assured the house that such penalty was already provided, but as usual was found to be wrong.

"There remains yet the important question to be dealt with of the recount in Prince Edward Island. Owing to the local law which has been adopted there seems to be no way of making good the error of the returning officer except by election petitions which open up all the questions under the Controverted Elections Act, so that it may cost the candidate a year or two of litigation and a thousand dollars or more to rectify an error in counting or blundering in throwing out votes."

This extract gives a good idea, not only of our men at Ottawa, but of the difficulties under which they labor. That they succeed in obtaining amendments in the face of Sir Louis Davies is good proof of their ability and persistency.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The German Government has chartered eight large steamers to transport troops to China.

—According to a despatch from Cape Town, President Kruger is reported to have moved to Nelspruit, the transport station for Lydenburg.

—Having learned a good deal about the geography of South Africa, we are now to study China. War is a great educator in these days of telegraphic communication and the newspaper.

—A Manual Training school is to be established at Charlottetown after the summer holidays. In the meantime teachers may receive instruction in manual training, free of cost, at Fredericton, N. B.

—A telegram received at the Colonial Office, in London from Col. Willocks, dated Fomena, July 3, states that native messengers from Pekin now at Bekwai, announced that the governor of Ashanti, Sir Frederic Mitchell Hodgson, several officers and their wives and families have left Kumassi and arrived at Ekwanta, twenty miles southeast of Kumassi. Messengers add that many were killed in breaking out of Kumassi. The rumor appears to be well founded.
