# Chisox Dump O's In Marathon; Dodgers Stop St. Louis Cards

A dozen pitchers were used in a three-hour, 37-minute marathon game on Wednesday by the second-place Chicago White Sox 12-0 over Baltimore Orioles.

In the National League, New York Giants topped Chicago Cubs 4-1 and Brooklyn Dodgers defeated St. Louis Cardinals 4-2 in afternoon games.

Chicago employed five hurlers and the Orioles seven to come close to the American League mark of 14 hurlers used by the two clubs in a game.

The winner was Morrie Martin, who came on in the sixth following Sox starter Howie Pollet, Gerry Staley, Sandy Consuegra and Dixie Howell.

Among the 15 hits bashed by the Sox was Larry Doby's No. 4 homer, while Baltimore's 14 hits included Jim Pyburn's No. 1 homer.

Hank Thompson, sidelined a week with headaches after a "beating" hit his first homer of the season with two men on base for the Giants.

Thompson's blow off loser Don Kaiser came with Jackie Brandt and Bill White on base in the fifth inning.

Brooklyn, who feasted on southpaws, used one of them to emerge from a three-game losing streak mauling Vinegar Bend Mizell for three runs in the third inning to defeat the Cardinals.

Roger Craig, Brooklyn's starter and winner, came within three outs of becoming the first Dodger pitcher in the last 12 games to go the route.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Al Rosen singled home a run in the tenth inning Wednesday night to give Cleveland Indians a 5-4 victory over Boston Red Sox.

DETROIT (AP)—Mickey Vernon hit two tremendous home runs Wednesday night to lead New York Yankees to a 4-1 triumph over Detroit Tigers before 47,756 fans.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Stan Lopata's 12th home run gave last-place Philadelphia a 3-2 victory over Cincinnati Wednesday night, topping the Redlegs from the National League lead as Curt Simmons scattered seven singles.

A crowd of 12,272 saw the Phillies score their second straight win over Cincinnati and take the rubber game of the series.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Danny O'Connell and Bobby Thomson provided the key hits in a five-run fifth inning outburst Wednesday night as Milwaukee Braves defeated Pittsburgh Pirates 7-3 and moved into first place in the National League. It was the Braves' fifth straight victory under new manager Fred Haney.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The annual congressional baseball game recorded a new "first" Wednesday—a hospital case—as House Republicans gloated over their second victory in nine years over House Democrats.

The Republicans broke a tie in the fifth and final inning of Tuesday night's charity contest at Griffith Stadium to make it two in a row over the Democrats.

The GOP's catcher, a 45-year-old Tom Curtis of Missouri, was not on hand at the finish but heard the good news at Bethesda Naval Hospital.

Curtis was rushed to the hospital in the fifth inning after being knocked over during a six-run rally. He suffered a dislocated left shoulder and won the acclaim of the spectators as he was carted away on a stretcher.

## Finisterre Snatches Trophy From Figaro By 4 Minutes

HAMILTON Bermuda (CP)—Carleton Mitchell, class D yawl, Finisterre from Annapolis, Md., snatched the Bermuda Trophy from C class Figaro by 14 minutes Wednesday, as another yacht whose home port is in Chesapeake Bay struck a reef and sank.

Comix to grief near the end of the 635-mile Newport, R.I.-Bermuda race, the 46-foot cutter Elda struck a reef and sank, but her

crew of eight including Henry A. Wise, Jr., of Wilmington, Del., owner and skipper, were safe. Elda's home port is Gibson Island, Md.

Figaro, a 47-foot class C yawl, owned and piloted by William T. Snaith, Georgetown, Conn., crossed the finish line at Saint David's head shortly after midnight. Her elapsed time in the race which began last Saturday was three days, nine hours, 38 minutes, 11 seconds, and corrected time was two days, 16 hours, 14 minutes, 11 seconds.

Then at 9:10 a.m. Finisterre crossed the line under full mainsail, mizzen staysail and spinnaker. With elapsed time of three days, 18 hours, 25 minutes, 55 seconds, the 39-foot Annapolis yawl had a corrected time of two days, 16 hours.

Eighty-nine yachts left Newport and the first to report was the big 73-foot class A yawl Bolero, which broke the course record upon arriving Tuesday. Bolero first to finish in the 1950 and 1954 Bermuda races and the 1951 and 1953 races to Annapolis, had an elapsed time of two days, 22 hours, 11 minutes, 40 seconds.

Finisterre cleaned up in the southern ocean racing circuit last winter. Her victories included an overall win in the St. Petersburg-Havana and the Lipton Cup races. The yawl is a centreboarder, built at Saybrook, Conn., in 1954, and with a masthead rig she is designed to carry some 713 square feet of canvas.
