ALL OVER THE PROVINCE.

A gentleman from Kelly's Cross, this morning, expresses the opinion that McLeod's election is sure, and that Beaton will probably go in. The former supporters of the Peters Administration are, he says, very much divided. Many of them will not poll their votes.

Advices from Montague Bridge state that the prospects are good for the election of both candidates in both the Cardigan and the Murray Harbor districts. The Government are giving lots of work out to voters, and this may somewhat affect the result.

A gentleman writing from King's County this morning declares that in his opinion "the Peters Government are doomed, any way."

Georgetown reports: "Prospects are the brightest of any election yet. No doubt of our men getting in. If rest of Island will do as well as King's County there would be nothing to fear. Boodler will not help in this district."

A telephonic despatch received from St. Peter's this morning reports most favorably from that district. "Mr. Serimgear went over to a place called Big Bush the other night to speak for Peters, and the people told him that if Mr. Peters could not come himself they did not want him. Mr. Merson's election is looked upon as certain, as electors have no use for Peters."

Summerside reports Lefurgy's election certain, with good prospects for DesRoches.

It is believed at Wellington that McDonald and Arsenault will carry the third district of Prince.

All accounts agree that Mr. McLeod will be elected in the first district of Queen's by a good majority, and many persons believe that Mr. Beaton, also, will ride in on the top of the wave of public indignation with the Government.

Our advices from Emerald are that "the election of William Campbell is sure." Mr. Ross, who is opposed to Mr. Bell, is having a hard battle, owing to the strong monetary influence of the latter. But there are good hopes that the independence of intelligent farmers will overcome this influence.

An elector of the district who attended the meeting at Tracadie Head, yesterday afternoon, reports that Mr. McLean made a splendid impression, speaking for an hour and a half with evident effect. Mr. Peters' address, he says, fell flat. He has attended three meetings in the district and believes that "Peters' goose is cooked." "Only money, and lots of it, can save him."

It is conceded that John McLean will easily defeat James R. and that the real fight is between Kickham and Robertson with fair prospects for the people's candidate as against one of the most obedient followers of Mr. Peters.

A FORECAST!

It is impossible to forecast absolutely the result of an election, especially when the Government Party has, in addition to the great influence which it may legitimately wield, the influence resulting from the illegitimate use of lots of money, both public and private. But judging by the reports received it seems highly probable that Prince County will return five opponents of the Peters' administration. Queen's, six and King's County eight—in all nineteen. This is a moderate estimate; and if it only should be realized the Peters' Government will go out, and the party led by the Hon. Daniel Gordon will have a good working majority.

Electors, work and vote for this result.

—The Summerside Journal reports that "Prince County is doing nobly. From every district come the most cheering assurances of a Conservative victory. When the voters are counted up, the Liberals will be surprised to see how many of their best men have been left at home. The people are tired of the present government, if the tone of the country, as expressed in public meetings and ascertained by personal canvass, is any indication at all."

—The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Archbishop of York and the Bishop of St. Asaph have been speaking on temperance within the past few weeks. The Archbishop of York remarked "he could hardly conceive any Bishop withholding his support from a movement of this kind." The Archbishop of Canterbury said, "he had always looked upon everything he could do for the promotion of the Temperance cause as being closely bound up with the work which he had to do as the minister of the Lord to the people of England." Some of our Bishops are much interested in promoting temperance; may the above examples influence other Bishops and clergy to do something more to minimize this fearful evil.

HAWAII AND UNITED STATES.

Hawaiian Commerce During the Last Ten Years the Subject of a Circular.

Hawaiian commerce during the last ten years is the subject of a circular just issued by the department of agriculture at Washington. The facts set forth bear directly upon the current discussion of the annexation of the Hawaiian Islands to the United States and are as follows: "The comparison of the statistics show that the United States controls ninety per cent of the entire trade of the islands. The total value of exports and imports of Hawaii for 1896 was \$22,578,882, of which about two-thirds, \$15,152,330 was the value of the goods exported. The average of exports for the ten years, 1887-1896, was \$11,053,141, and of imports \$5,527,459 leaving an average balance of \$3,628,681 in favor of exports.

On this total 91.2 per cent was with the United States during the first five years of the decade and in the second five years this lead of this country over other countries was increased to 91.92 per cent.

The United States, however, does not yet hold so high a position in furnishing goods for Hawaii as in taking the products of the islands. Of the average exports for the ten years, nearly eleven million dollars a year, the United States has bought practically all. Of the goods purchased by Hawaii on the other hand the United States furnished only about three-fourths. However, it is chiefly in sales to the islands that the trade is growing. The annual average of these sales for the five years, 1887-1891, was \$4,376,312, but for 1891-1896, \$5,496,275, while the exports to Hawaii for last year amounted to \$5,464,208, nearly a million dollars more than for any previous year.

The goods coming from Hawaii to the United States are mainly agricultural products, while the shipments in the other directions, except breadstuffs, are chiefly manufactures. The imports of sugar make it a largest item of the trade, while the imports of rice come next. Next in order are the exports of breadstuffs, cotton goods, fertilizers, machinery, lumber, tobacco, wine and chemicals.

Prior to 1876, when the first reciprocity treaty was made between the United States and Hawaii the total commerce averaged only \$1,950,936. Since that date a comparatively steady growth has brought the total to more than five times that amount. Figures are furnished for the next ten months of the fiscal year 1897, as compared with the same period in 1896. They show large increases in the important items of trade. The other countries whose trade with Hawaii appears to be growing are China and Japan, taken together, and Canada."

LARGE MEETING AT NEW HAVEN.

The hall at New Haven was packed last night by an intelligent and orderly audience and there was almost as many outside unable to get admittance. The speaking was kept up till almost one o'clock this morning. The peoples' candidates have every reason to feel pleased with the result. Mr. Farquharson was the first speaker and he occupied the time for about an hour. His effort was a very labored one and he made an unusually poor impression on the audience. He didn't even attempt to defend the many wrong doings of the government but satisfied himself with denouncing previous governments and blowing about Laurier and Davies.

Mr. McMullan followed and astonished his friends with the spirit and energy which he threw into his address. He was most attentively listened to.

Mr. Wise replied in a good natured way which indicated that even he had lost faith in the government.

Mr. Horne came next with a really good speech bristling with arguments and facts. Mr. James McLean made a short reply. Mr. W. S. Stewart was called upon and responded amidst cheers. His speech was a most severe condemnation of the government, its deception, its extravagance and its boodling. The charge against the government of having squandered \$6,000,000 of the public money and of having concealed and covered up the transaction in connection with the building of the Boodler was proved to the satisfaction of every one. Mr. Farquharson and his satellites were thunderstruck as Mr. Stewart laid bare this most indefensible job and exposed the hollow bluffing of Mr. Farquharson in connection therewith.

Mr. Stewart received a splendid reception in this heretofore stronghold of the enemy and Mr. Farquharson is but too sorry he invited him there.

Mr. Scott closed the meeting with a few remarks.
