

# Accident Delays Drilling Project

An accident to the tower used in test drilling operations in the Northumberland Strait for the proposed causeway will delay start of the test borings for a few days.

One of the anchors holding the 45 to 50 foot drilling tower in place became loose and when the tower began to tilt a winch was used to take up the slack in the anchor line. The anchor dragged and the tower toppled over 10 to 15 feet of water about 4,000 feet off Jourmain Island.

Three men working on the tower platform fell into the water but were in no danger as they were wearing life preservers.

A spokesman for Northumberland Consultants Limited said yesterday it is believed the anchor loosened when the tug working around the project bumped the tower.

The spokesman said it will be a simple matter to raise the tower again but drilling operations will be delayed a few days. He said also that the tug was damaged and further delay may result because of this.

# Lobster Catch Drops After Good Haul Mon.

SUMMERSIDE — "Pretty good yesterday, not too good today," is how local fishermen yesterday termed lobster catches off the southern Prince Edward island coast for the past two days.

Each of the six fishermen queried said that yesterday's catch was as good as Monday's haul and in all respects the first two days of this year's season are far below the catches of last year.

One crew reported a take of five crates yesterday compared to one on Monday. A full crate averages approximately 110 pounds.

A second said their traps averaged 1 1/2 pounds and they brought in 164 pounds, "we had almost double that on Monday" said one of the pair followed by more than 100 hours at sea.

Another said his crew took in 30 pounds Tuesday as compared to 615 Monday. The catch Monday represented two days fishing as four traps are hauled Sunday.

One fisherman a veteran of 20 years on the south side fishing grounds said that this year's Cape Island boats and a number of outboard motor craft were the largest number of boats operating out of Summerside in recent years.

# 4 Forest Fires Burning In N.S.

HALIFAX (CP) — Rain forecast for today was expected to extinguish four fires which broke out in Nova Scotia woodlands Tuesday.

Forest officials said Tuesday night most serious of the fires was one which destroyed about two acres of forest at Coal Harbor, six miles east of here. Water bombing aircraft were used to bring the blaze under control.

Other fires reported under control late Tuesday night were a burning in the Westport district of Dartmouth, Bridgewater and Kentville. All were small.

# BREAD JUMPS THREE CENTS

Island housewives are finding the price of bread has gone up in the past couple of days. A loaf of the staff of life now costs 27 cents. It was 24 cents.

Mainland bakeries distributing in the province have jacked up their prices and Island-based bakeries will probably follow suit in the interest of fair competition.

The customer in the store will be paying increased prices however, whether or not Island bakeries raise their prices, as the grocer sets his own retail level and usually sells all the bread in his store at the same price.

The price was increased by two cents on Monday and another cent was added to the price yesterday. Bakeries in Halifax and Moncton announced a week ago they would jack the price by two cents.

This is the second increase in the price of bread within a year in this province which is a total increase of five cents a loaf, thus giving the Island the dubious distinction of having the highest bread prices in the Dominion outside of some parts of Newfoundland.

# Horlick Fortune Heir Dies At 50

CHICAGO (AP) — William Horlick Sidley, 50, heir to the Horlick milk fortune, died in hospital Tuesday of what coroner's investigators said they believed was an overdose of sleeping tablets.

His address was listed as Cedar Valley Farms at Sandwich, Ill. He also maintained a home in Wisconsin.

In April he and Mrs. June Anderson Sidley, 45, reached a property settlement in her suit for divorce, the terms of which were not made public.

Mrs. Sidley charged him with drunkenness and desertion. The Sidleys had an adopted daughter, Maureen, 6.

Involved in the court case, brought in Kendall County, was more than \$2,000,000 which Sidley inherited from his mother, Mrs. Mabelle Horlick Sidley, who died in 1938 in Toronto.

(CP) — An expectant mother and her husband escaped from the second floor of their home-restaurant at nearby Mount Brydges Tuesday by leaping from the roof of the building which was destroyed by fire. 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# City Proposals Given Approval

Charlottetown was given the "green light" yesterday for its plans to build an incinerator and institute a system of compulsory garbage collection. Provincial Government approval came through Municipal Affairs Minister J. David Stewart.

A delegation from the City, headed by Arthur Gormley, chairman of the Public Property Committee met with Minister

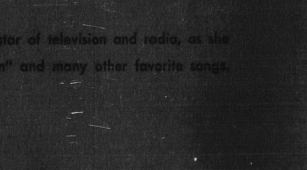

# POLO CASES REPORTED

MONTREAL (CP) — Five new cases of polio have been admitted to hospital here, raising the number of such admissions to 31 this summer. It was announced Tuesday. Most of the victims are from Quebec's Eastern Townships area and none were reported to have received the full Salk anti-polio vaccine series of four shots. Three of the five new cases were reported to be severe.

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
