## Brothers Given Two-Year Terms

SUMMERSIDE — Two year sentences in Dorchester Penitentiary were handed out to Freeman Austin Bernard, 22, and his brother Joseph Lee Bernard, 17, by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court here yesterday. The Lennox Island residents were charged with assault causing bodily harm.

George McMahon, acting for the crown, told the court the man allegedly assaulted by the accused spent nine days in hospital.

In sentencing the two Magistrate MacDonald said it was the worst case of assault that had ever come before him.

Bernard St. Clair McCabe represented the accused.

Similar charges against two brothers of the accused were dismissed.

A Summerside man, Alan Ellsworth Callbeck, was fined \$125 and costs or two months on a dangerous driving charge. His license was also suspended for a three month period. Members of the RCMP reported following the accused at speeds as high as 110 miles per hour. The charge pleaded guilty to the charge.

IMPAIRED DRIVING — Three persons were charged with impaired driving. Edward Joseph Gallant of Richmond and William Havelock Calhoun of Carleton were each fined \$75 and costs or 15 days. They both pleaded guilty to the charge. Melville Campbell represented the latter.

No plea was taken from John Nelson Diamond of St. Eleanor's. His case was adjourned to Sept. 14.

SUMMERSIDE — Edwin Lewis, vice-chairman of the school board of Athena Regional High School, last night said no announcements had been made by the government concerning the location of the retail liquor store 200 yards from Athena.

Yesterday was the final day of an ultimatum given the government by a delegation of ratepayers last week.

Earlier in the day Earl Cannon, chairman of the school board, said the march on Charlottetown by the Athena ratepayers is tentatively set for next Tuesday, Sept. 14.

A meeting of the peoples committee is to be held tonight to finalize plans.

Tuesday is the usual day for the weekly meeting of government.

The ultimatum given the government was extended to last night to allow for the labor day holiday.

The march is to be a public protest of the government's refusal to consider the objections of the ratepayers to locating a liquor store near the school.
