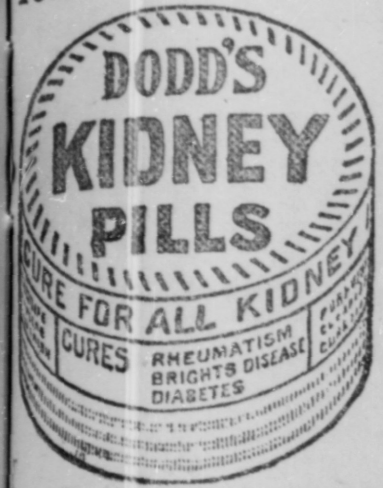

Local and Other Items

NOVA SCOTIA RAILWAY.—The railway from Yarmouth to Shelburne is to be in operation by the 1st of July.

GOOD SIZED WHALE.—A whale recently secured by fishermen at Half Island Cove, N. S., is over 80 feet long and about 15 feet across the tail.

WAR COMES HIGH.—The cost to the United States of the war with Spain is estimated to amount to not less than three hundred million dollars up to date.

DE-ROYED.—A good many lobster traps were destroyed on the north side of the Island by Thursday's storm. Some of the fishermen lost about all of their traps and lines. This is a serious set back to them right at the beginning of the season. Those who had no gear out were the lucky ones.—Agriculturist.

WHERE ARE THE FREE TRADERS

The effort of the G'obs to reconcile the present Liberal trade policy with the policy which was enunciated during the Opposition era are distinctly amusing.

Here is a sample: "The Liberal party in Opposition said in effect that every legitimate industry of the country would be benefited by abandoning the policy of restriction and substituting for it a policy that removed the weights from the heels of enterprise. The issue was made distinct enough."

The issue was certainly distinct, and it was enunciated in this way:—"Protection is bad in principle from centre to circumference. It is utterly pernicious, the product of selfishness, and the fruitful parent of immorality. Import duties, like every other tax, are an evil, and the men or journals who advocate such duties beyond the absolute necessities of national revenue, or from any other purpose than as a contribution to such revenue, are as unpatriotic and un-British as they are selfish."

The method of "removing the weights from the heels of enterprise" is found to Mr. Fielding's announcement that "we do not propose, Mr. Speaker, to make any changes in the tariff this session."
