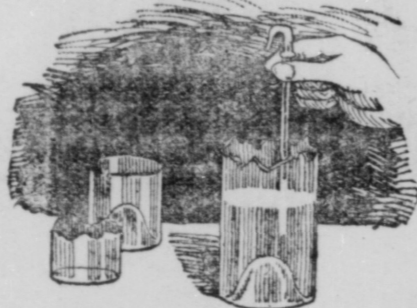
HOW TO CUT GLASS.

With Oil and a Hot Poker You Can Make Rings Out of a Bottle.

This week we give you a somewhat unique way of utilizing a broken bottle. Even if you do not care to make a practical use of the suggestion you will find it an interesting experiment in the study of heat.

When the neck of a bottle is broken off, a ragged edge is left, which wholly unfit for the bottle for any use whatever, except to be thrown on the ash heap. Let us see how we may save it from that melancholy fate.

Place the bottom part of the broken bottle on a table and pour oil into it until it reaches the point where you would like to have the bottle cut. Then heat the end of an iron poker redhot and plunge it sud-



denly into the oil. There will be a little snapping sound, and you will see that the glass has been evenly cut all around on a level with the oil. The accompanying illustration shows the whole process.

If you wish to carry your experiment a little further and make a number of glass rings, you have only to remove part of the oil every time and repeat the process above described. Pour out, say, half an inch of the oil each time, and you may easily make several rings half an inch in breadth.

You will recognize in this experiment the same principle as in the fracture of a cold glass when hot water or hot coffee is poured into it. Glass is a poor conductor of heat, and the fracture is caused by the expansion of the inside of the vessel before the heat can get to the outside.—Philadelphia Times.

THE RAILWAY SYSTEM.

The railway system in the United States employs 36,000 locomotives, 25,000 passenger cars and 8,000 mail and baggage cars. These figures seem large till the number of freight cars is stated, which is 1,250,000. A passenger train consisting of locomotive, tender, baggage and six passenger cars, with their contents, is estimated to weigh about 184 tons. Freight trains sometimes reach a weight of 550 tons. An ordinary passenger car costs from \$4,000 to \$5,000 and a sleeping car anywhere from \$10,000 to \$20,000. The system, with its gigantic equipment, is practically the growth of a single generation. With the additions of another quarter or half a century posterity ought to stand and gaze at its stupendous proportions. But it will probably be gradually educated out of all its capacities of wonder, as we have been out of many of our own.—New York Tribune.

The Overruling of a Judge.

A judge the other day awoke in the night to find his room in the possession of two armed burglars. Covered by the pistol of one of the marauders, the judge watched the proceedings with his usual judicial calm. One of the deprecators found a watch. "Don't take that," the judge said, "it has little value and is a keepsake." "The motion is overruled," replied the burglar. "I appeal," rejoined the judge. The two burglars consulted, and the spokesman then replied: "The appeal is allowed. The case coming on before a full tribunal of the supreme court, that body is of the unanimous opinion that the decree of the lower court should be sustained, and it is accordingly so ordered." Pocketing the watch, court adjourned.—Household Words.

Flower Study.

Children in many European countries have excellent opportunity for the study of botany. The little city people have plants especially supplied them, and in a province of southern Russia 253 acres are devoted to school gardens. These gardens are planted with fruit and forest trees. Teachers instruct in tree, vine, grain and garden and also give lessons in the culture of bees and silk worms.

Besides Russia, Sweden, France, Aus-

tria and Germany provide opportunities for their children in this branch of education. In Berlin two large wagons loaded with plant specimens deliver cuttings which have been labeled and packed for different schools, the daily papers having already notified what kinds are to be expected.—Baltimore Herald.

AMERICA'S RAPHAEL.

A Picture Which, It is Said, Has Yet to be Discovered.

There is one picture in America which, for convenience's sake, may be designated "Fata Morgana." It is frequently alluded to and always in a tone of reverent admiration. When one is in New York one hears of it as in Boston. When one is in Boston one hears of it as either in New York or Philadelphia. If the quest be pursued in these cities the picture is said to be located in Baltimore and so forth. What is this mysterious work which would appear to be considered as the chief treasure of art in America? It is a wholly imaginary Raphael. I found the most rooted conviction in all so-called "art circles" that America is the happy possessor not only of a Raphael, but of a superbly fine example of that master, and, as already indicated, the picture is not only alluded to with pride, but with an admiration that is akin to awe.

It is unfortunate that the picture does not exist, except in the fervent transatlantic imagination. In a word, there is no Raphael in America. Strangely enough, there are very few forgeries even, the one or two canvases with any approach to the manner of the great Italian master being so obviously imitative that no one with any adequate knowledge of his work could possibly be deceived. It is, however, a pleasant fiction, and enables patriotic Americans in Europe to enlarge upon the superb masterpieces overseas.—Nineteenth Century.
