THIS AGRICULTURAL INDUSTRY

Opinion Sharply Split On Potato Seed Issue

By NEIL A. MATHESON - Prince Edward Island agriculturalists in general, and dairy-farmers in particular will be interested in the news that Canada's minister of agriculture, J.J. Greene, is coming to Charlottetown next month. Mr. Greene will speak to the dairymen at their annual dinner meeting here Friday night, March 25. There's the probability, I understand, that he will meet a number of island farm leaders at a luncheon meeting on the following day.

It should be interesting for our representative farm people to meet with the first Canadian agricultural minister from Eastern Canada. We've had a large number from the West where there's a tendency, and I suppose it may be natural, for them to think anything else is small potatoes compared to their huge grain industry.

I see considerable trouble ahead for the people who are insisting that the rule about planting nothing but certified seed potatoes, or better, be strictly enforced this year. I recognize that the department of agriculture people, both federal and provincial, and a large number of potato growers feel that's the best way to stamp out the threat of ring rot, a disease that gained alarming headway here last year.

I have no quarrel with those people. I know they're sincere in their belief, for I've talked with many of them. In addition I've no specialized knowledge of potatoes which would warrant my expressing a personal opinion. But I've also talked with island farmers who think otherwise. There are many of these men, and they are most emphatic in their opinion that the "plant nothing but certified seed, or better," idea is not the proper method of wiping out disease.
