Ottawa PTA Meeting Planned But No Communists Allowed

The annual conference of the Canadian Home and School and Parent-Teacher Federation voted Wednesday to support, but not sponsor, a proposed parent-teacher relationships conference in Ottawa during Canada's centennial year.

During sessions on the fourth day of the six-day meeting, delegates heard the report of the association's international committee on a proposal to hold a world conference in 1967 to promote better understanding of international family and educational relationships.

The International Union of Family Organizations (IUFO) advised the committee it would accept the Canadian invitation to attend the conference only if communist countries are not invited.

Home and school delegates were told the original intention of the proposed world meeting was to develop a better understanding between parent-teacher associations in all countries and to include communist nations.

AGENTS NOT PTA GROUPS

Mrs. Ralph Foss of Knoxville, Tenn., vice-president of the United States PTA National Congress, said the PTA and U.S. representatives of the IUFO felt delegates from "behind the iron curtain" would not be representing actual parent-teacher groups, but were agents of totalitarian governments.

If such countries were invited, Mrs. Foss said she was quite sure "the American PTA would not support the conference."

The IUFO's decision to attend

of non-communist countries forces the home and school to reconsider its proposal.

National President C. M. Bedford of Saskatoon said the alternative was to abandon the idea or hold the conference according to the IUFO's wishes.

Jack Shivers of Montreal, Canadian chairman of the IUFO, said Japan has also stated its desire to attend an international conference which would be a family or parent-teacher organization.

He was certain representatives of non-communist countries would be delegates by governments and would not be representing family or parent-teacher organizations.

He urged the home and school to continue its plans to sponsor the conference and opposed the IUFO that the association withdrew its sponsorship.

IUFO TO SPONSOR

The motion, passed by a small majority of the voting delegates, called for the Canadian division of the International Union of Family Organizations to undertake "the sponsoring role previously envisaged for the

Home and School and Parent-Teacher Federation. The motion also said the Home and School should give as much support as possible to an international conference "within the limitations of our regular functions."

Earlier in the day, John Parker of Montreal proposed a world university project for Home and School consideration. He said there is a need for bilingual civil servants in the federal service and suggested a world university in Canada as a training ground for civil servants from every country.

He said the university could form "a central course in the study of western civilization," and proposed the institution be constructed on the Montreal World's Fair site after the 1967 centennial celebrations end.

This would be a "logical step following an international world's fair," he said.

The Home and School conference decided to send copies of the suggestion to Prime Minister Pearson and former U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower, who had expressed a similar idea while he was president.

Woman Killed in Car Crash

A two-car collision just south of Cherry Valley Corner on the Trans Canada Highway about noon yesterday claimed the life of a Windsor, N.S. woman and sent four other persons to hospital.

The woman, whose name was not released, was a passenger in a Nova Scotia-registered car which collided with a P.E.I. vehicle believed to be Dan MacRae, 86, of Hetheraldie. Both vehicles were demolished.

Two children and a man were also travelling in the Nova Scotia car. All were admitted to the P.E.I. Hospital with various injuries. One of the children was believed in critical condition and the man seriously injured. The other child was believed not serious. Mr. MacRae was also admitted to hospital.

The accident occurred on a straight stretch of highway, about three-quarters of a mile east of the Cherry Valley intersection. The Nova Scotia car was loaded with camping equipment which indicated the family was either bound for a vacation outing in the province, or returning home following a visit in the province.

Traffic was tied up for miles in either direction as five ambulances sped to the scene to bring the injured to hospital. Emergency treatment was given at the scene by Mr. and Mrs. Roy C. Maddox of Massachusetts, two hospital employees who stopped at the scene moments after the accident took place.

Dr. John C. Gillis, E.D., attended the injured and RCMP from Charlottetown and Montserrat investigated.
