Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner:

MONTREAL, Nov. 19.

Floor fairly active and firm. Stocks are small.

The S. S. "Thames," over due fifteen days from Liverpool to Quebec, has arrived at St. John's, Nfld. She reports the loss of two officers, and is badly damaged.

Money is being put out in Quebec by the Grits. Both sides are working hard. The Conservatives are confident of victory.

The Government steamer "Newfield" is loading goods for the Paris Exposition. The display of Canadian manufactures will be small.

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

A St. Petersburg despatch states that the Minister of War has ordered the preparation of stores necessary for the mobilization of the remainder of the army.

Andrassy has declared his belief that Serbia will not break the peace.

CONSTANTINOPLE, N. V. 17.

At the Council, over which the Sultan presided, held yesterday, the general feeling was expressed, and by no one more strongly than the Sultan, in favor of making an effort to put an end to the war, in which enough has been done on both sides for glory, and which, if continued, must inflict a lasting injury on both countries. It was felt, however, that at present sufficient reliance cannot be placed upon the declaration of Russia, and that even while seeking to obtain honorable peace, preparations for prolonged resistance must be vigorously carried on. The Grand Vizier will, to-day, inform Mr. Layard, the British ambassador, of the decision of the Council, in hope that England will aid in putting a stop to the war which so greatly damages her own trade and threatens to compromise her best interests.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

The Bulgarian inhabitants of Vratza have massacred the Mussulman inhabitants.

Gen. Skobeloff, the Russian commander, was slightly wounded on the 15th, but still retains his command.

A decree has been published, convoking the Roumanian chamber on the 27th inst.

LONDON, Nov. 18.

An official Russian despatch dated Veran-Kaleh, Sunday, 18th inst. says: "The Russians carried Kars to-day by storm. The battle preceding the capture commenced at eight o'clock last night, and terminated at eight o'clock this morning. Our losses are at present unknown."

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 18.

A report is current that the Russians have made an assault on Plevna and been repulsed.

LONDON, Nov. 18.

A Russian official despatch, dated Bogot, on the 17th inst., says: "News is just received that a detachment of Cossacks and infantry succeeded in driving the Turks out of Rusalie Pass by turning their fortified positions on Morsgardagh. The Turkish camp there was captured."

Gen. Skobeloff during the skirmish on the night of the 16th inst., received a severe contusion from fragments of a shell. He had already received similar contusions on the 15th. His wounds, however, are not dangerous, and he continues to direct the fire maintained against Turkish positions.

LONDON, Nov. 18.

A despatch to the "Standard" from Sophia reports that the Russians on Friday attacked Itrapol and the Turkish positions at the entrance of the Orchanic defile. They were repulsed with heavy loss.

The Vienna correspondent of the "Times" says that it seems to be believed at Constantinople that Osman Pasha can hold out till the beginning of December. Russia is urging Serbia to co-operate in the war in view of operations for the relief of Blevna which Mehemet Ali is expected to commence in the last week in November.

The number of ocean steamers frequenting the port of Gibraltar is between two and three hundred a year. Custom House regulations and supervision do not exist, and the only expense imposed on ships anchoring in the harbor is represented by the port duties. Vessels of every calibre and of all nations are free to come and go without inspection or detection. This has made the port on of regular call for vessels arriving from and bound to every quarter of the globe. The chief revenue is derived from port charges, which aggregate \$600,000 a year.

THE "CIRASSIAN" THIEF.—The notorious individual, Springli, who was arrested in Quebec for robbery on board the S. S. "Circa-sian," is one of the most clever of the light-fingered gentry known. He is a native of Switzerland, and in 1875 the London (Eng.) "Daily News" gave at length an account of his exploits. It appears in that year he committed robberies on board the ships "Liguria" and "Potosi," and was finally arrested, but nothing could be found in his trunk. After this he was again arrested, and this time upon his trunk being searched sixteen different compartments were discovered, filled with sovereigns, watches, etc. Springli is 30 years of age and speaks four languages. He was formerly a merchant in Africa, but about two years ago he went to Europe and turned *chevalier d'industrie*. On one occasion a Spaniard, a passenger on board a certain ship, had \$1,000 stolen from him, and the party who was the first to head the subscription for the victim was Springli; he gave \$40.—*Moncton Times.*

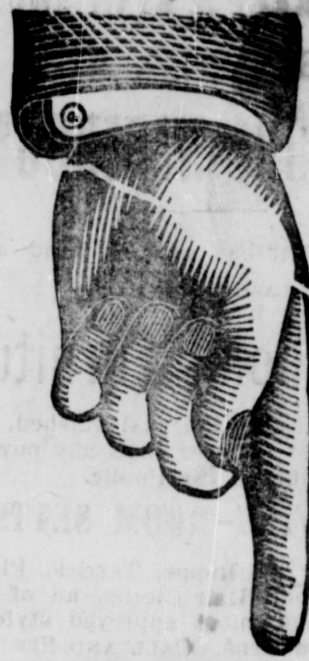
